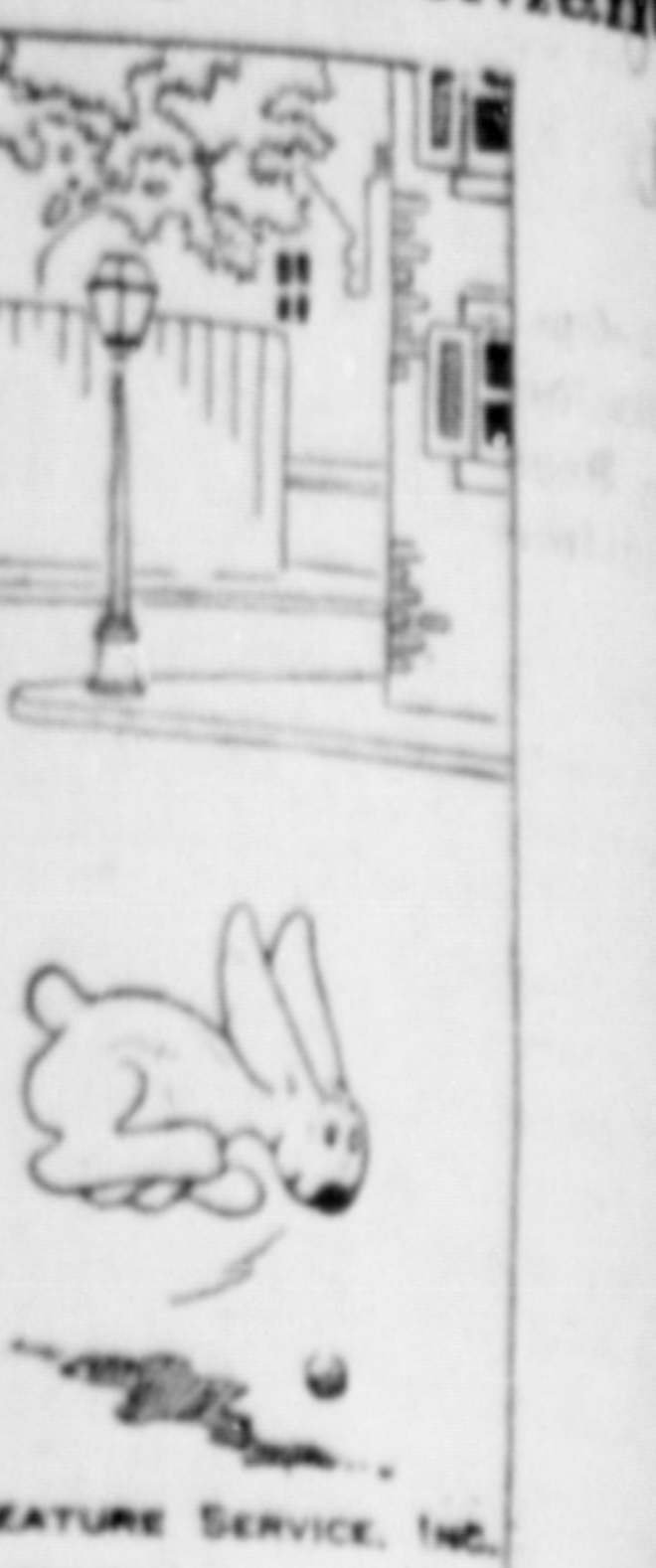

BRINGING UP FATHER

MORE MEN TEACHERS
PRESENT NEED SAYS
MANITOBA'S PREMIER

WINNIPEG, Mar. 6.—I am convinced we need more men in the teaching profession and until that stage is reached education in this country will be inefficient and inadequate. This is the statement made by Premier John Bracken, when he addressed the annual convention of the Manitoba Schools trustees association.

Premier Bracken invited the trustees to make recommendations to the government regarding the composition of the royal commission which will this summer investigate the educational system of Manitoba. The five weaknesses of the rural school he outlined as being irregularity of attendance, inexperienced teachers, too frequent changes in teachers, falling off in attendance after the fourth grade and want of understanding on the part of teachers of the needs of rural life.

FURS SELL POORLY
WINNIPEG AUCTION

About Five Per Cent Drop Recorded on Average of Business

WINNIPEG, March 6.—Limited bidding with the market inclined to weakness prevailed at the sale held by the Winnipeg Fur Auction company at the Royal Alexandra hotel. It was stated by purchasers that the fur business was a little too high for the ideas of the public at present. The first important lot to fall were beaver, of which there were 17 groups. These sold on the open market basis and about five per cent lower than at the preceding sale, it was estimated. Beaver were reported not to be moving at this time of year, and on some sides they were said to be neglected. Mink lots of which there were 74, varied in quality and price, the latter ranging from \$1.50 to \$10 per skin. The average was about \$6.50 per skin for good ones and twos. In the silver fox division there were 72 lots with wide spreads between price quotations, the range being from \$20 to \$135 per pelt. Other lots disposed of were: 57 cross fox; 31 red fox; 5 white fox; 35 martens; 62 fisher; 26 otter; 41 weasel; 20 lynx; 23 skunk; 9 bear; 48 wolf and 45 rat, in addition to several miscellaneous.

EDMONTON CUTS OUT
MANUAL ARTS IN THE
HIGH SCHOOL COURSE

Eliminates One Grade from School Thus Saving Six Thousand Dollars

EDMONTON, March 6.—Elimination of the domestic science and manual art courses as well as the discontinuing of the teaching of the twelfth grade work in the high schools after September 1, was approved by the Edmonton public school board. Another new departure which was approved by the board and will go into effect September 1, will be free school books and supplies for all students up to the eighth grades.

The discontinuing of the teaching of the twelfth grade work although opposed by superintendent W. G. Carpenter was passed by the board with a unanimous vote. The original notice of motion was made by Trustee Dr. Craig as a means of reducing expenses of the school board and although there was a considerable discussion over it was considered by the majority that this work could well be carried on in the university and the school board be saved that much expense.
