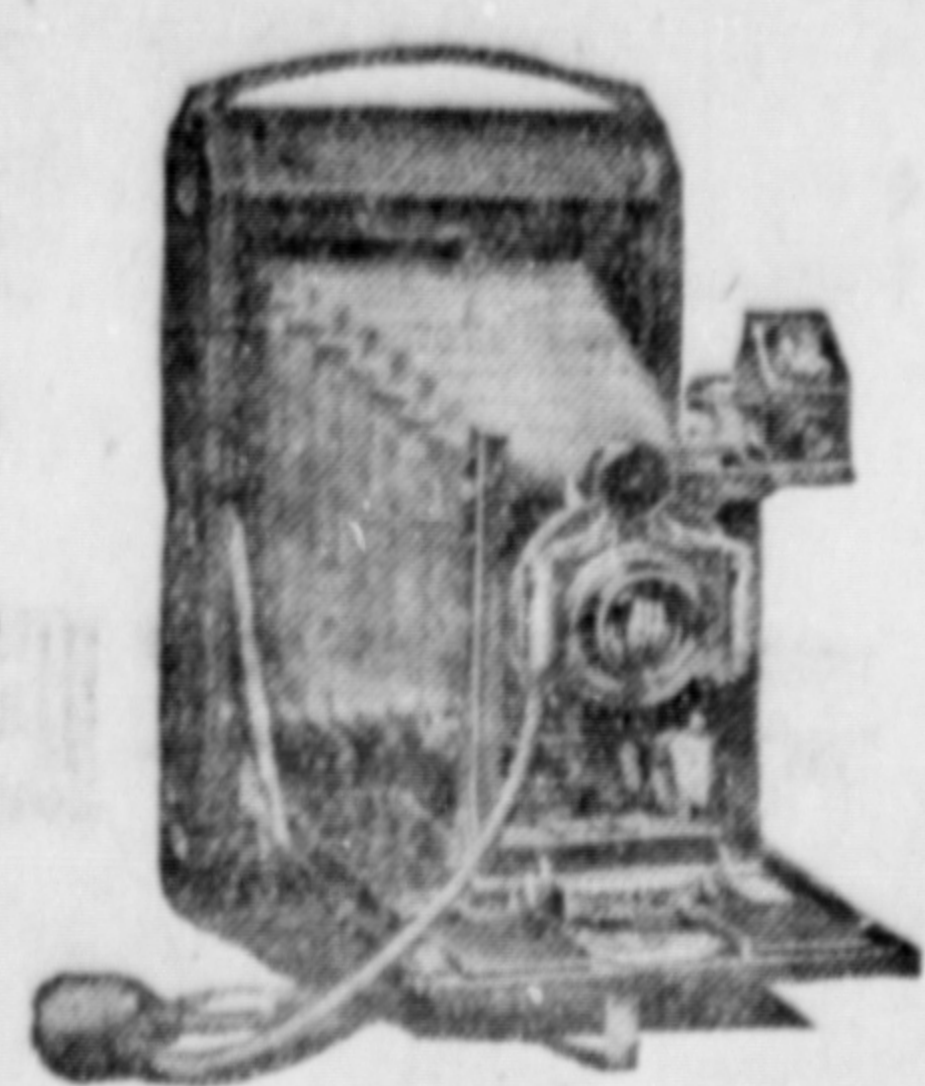

window was withdrawn.

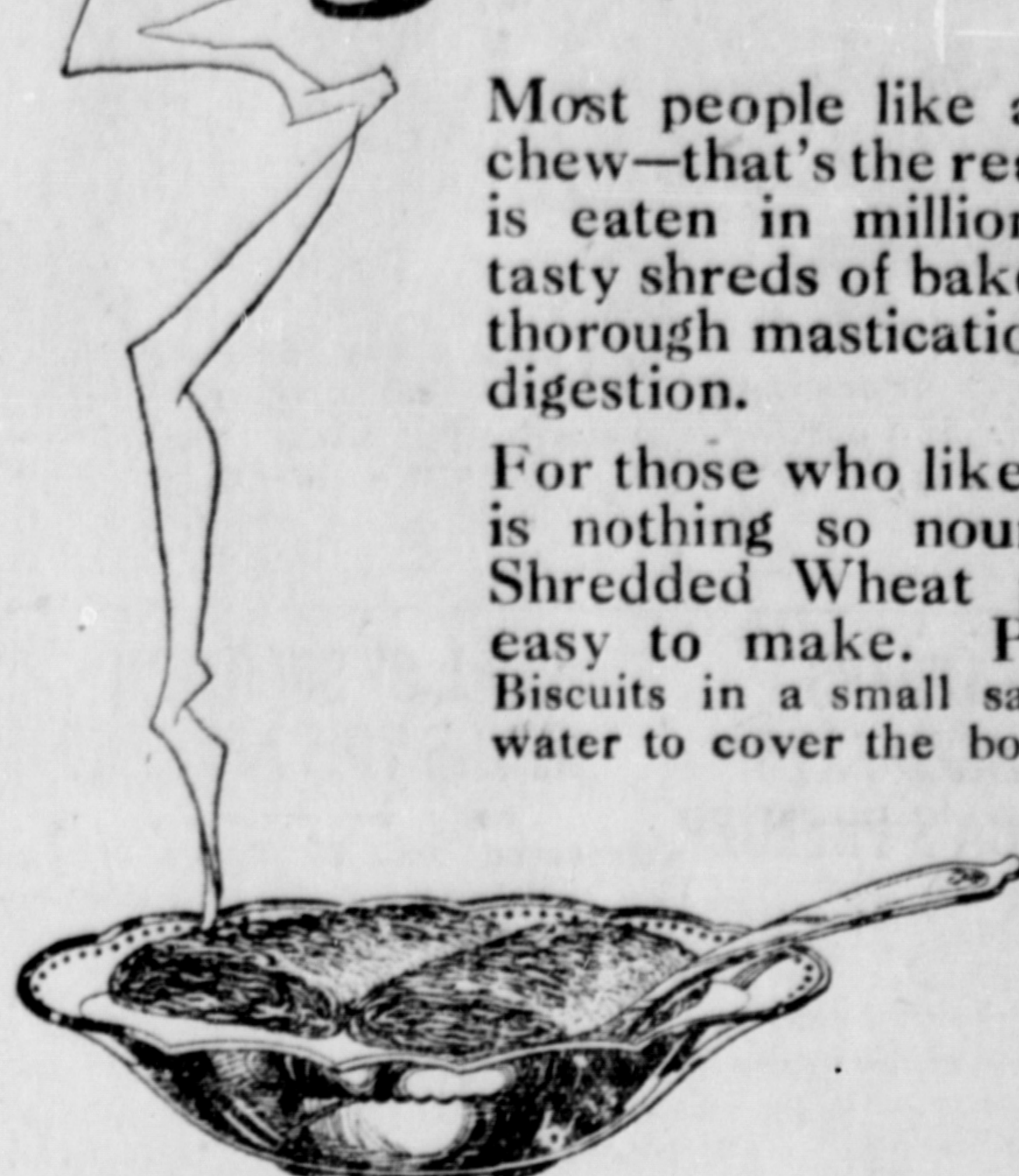

The city council had a com-
mittee of the whole conference
with F. W. Pearson, the new city
engineer, following the regular
meeting last night. Owing to
