Being cut off at a bridge by the pursuing French soldiers, they boldly leap their horses over the parapet and so effect their escape.

PRINCE RUPERT PLACES HER CASE FOR GRAIN ELEVATOR BEFORE GRAIN COMMISSION AT CITY HALL TODAY

were not needed here.

R. Beaumont corroborated the unlikelihood of there being port charges here. At present this was a free port. He told of the advantages of the harbor and port and its closeness to the sailing circle of vessels from the south. The slight handicap to the Panama of 280 miles was almost nothing in a voyage of thousands of miles. There were plenty of good sites here where ships might lie alongside the elevator. There was no compulsory pilotage and it was quite feasible to use this port without any tolls except Dominion government small charges payable by all ports in Canada. He suggested that this port was destined to become one of the great trade ports of Canada no matter what was done just now.

Good Site Here

W. H. Tobey explained the facilities here. There was a good elevator site between Pillsbury Point and Fairview with plenty of room for trackage. The road bed was such as to insure expeditious movement of grain. There was no question that Prince Rupert had advantages over any other Pacific port.

S. E. Parker spoke of the prospects of the Peace River country, and said an elevator was necessary to the development of the railway.

P. H. Pillsbury mentioned the dry dock facilities and its bearing on the grain shipping business.

J. W. Nicholls outlined possible freights which might be carried from this port much of which would be return cargoes on the railway. He also said he had the assurance from one of the big shipping companies that their ships would come here provided there were facilities and cargo.

E. F. Doby spoke of the lumber trade in its relation to grain shipments and of the likely developments of the near future. Other speakers were M. P. McCaffery, S. J. McLeod, S. K. Campbell, and H. St. G. Lee, all of whom urged the erection of the elevator and strengthened the case for this port.

This afternoon a number of the visitors attended the luncheon of the Rotary Club and later were taken out on the harbor in the Fispa. They leave for the east this evening.

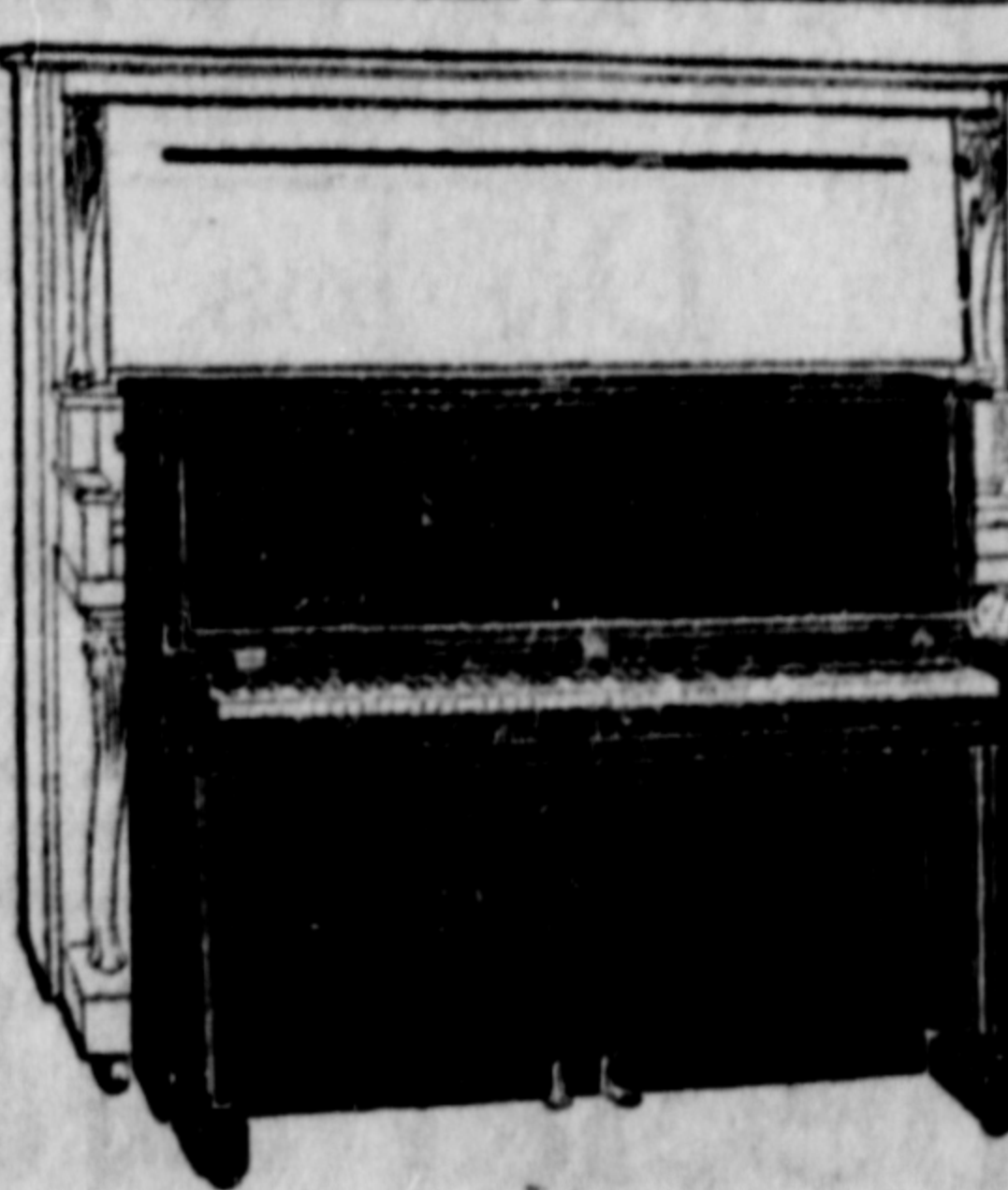
