MORE BODIES FROM WRECK FOUND

VANCOUVER MAN DIES, RESULT OF ELEVEN STOREY FALL

John Loftus Loses His Life in Plunging From Dominion Bank Block

Unfortunate Man Struck His Head on Pavement at Corner of Hastings and Cambie Streets and Death Came Instantaneously

VANCOUVER, Dec. 7.—John Loftus, aged 45, of Vancouver, plunged 110 feet to his death here today when he either jumped or fell from the eleventh storey of the Dominion Bank Building at the northwest corner of Hastings and Cambie Streets. He struck the concrete pavement and it is believed death was instantaneous.

ADVANCE RECORDED

Stocks Go Up on New York Market in Response to President's Message to Congress

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Responding to President Hoover's message to Congress urging the balancing of the budget and international co-operation, stocks advanced sharply from one to five points on the New York Stock Exchange yesterday. The day's turnover amounted to 1,100,000 shares.

Industrials closed at an average of 59.59, up 3.06; rails closed at 26.81, up 2.22, and utilities at 26.69, up 1.10.

Business Men Are Charged

TO BUILD BIG SPAN

\$75,000,000 Project to Connect San Francisco and Oakland

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 7.—Contracts will be let next spring for the new \$75,000,000 bridge project connecting San Francisco and Oakland. It will be the second major bridge project here, a start having already been made on the \$32,000,000 Golden Gate bridge.

ITALY TO MAKE ITS WAR DEBT PAYMENT
ROME, Dec. 7.—Disregarding the appeals of other European nations for postponement of their payments, Premier Benito Mussolini announced yesterday that the Italian government had decided to make its war debt payment of \$1,245,000 to the United States when it becomes due on December 15.

GENERAL IS IN FLIGHT

Chinese Commander and One Thousand Men Retreat to Siberia

TSITIHAR, Manchuria, Dec. 7.—Japanese Army headquarters confirmed yesterday that the Chinese general, Su Ping Wen, had fled into Siberia with one thousand of his men while a snowstorm halted the advance of the Japanese.

Russian news sources said that the Chinese were disarmed by the Russian authorities.

VISA FOR EINSTEIN

German Scientist Permitted to Enter United States After Being Held Up For a Time

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 7.—Dr. Albert Einstein, German scientist, who is planning to take up residence in the United States, was granted a visa by the State Department yesterday. He had threatened to return to Germany because he objected to being questioned in regard to his views on communism and other matters.

The Women's Patriotic Association had asked the State Department to bar Einstein from this country because of his alleged communist leanings.

CO-OP IS SUCCESS

Cape Breton Tramways Ltd. Announces Wage Increase

SYDNEY, N.S., Dec. 7.—The value of co-operation was emphasized when the Cape Breton Tramways Limited announced a 10% salary increase effective immediately.

Owned by its employees, this system is one of the few tram lines on the continent showing a profit. A year ago employees, facing unemployment when the Cape Breton Electric Co. went into liquidation, pooled their savings and bought the rolling stock and operating rights of the company.

BEER BILL IS COMING

Legislation to Modify Volstead Act Being Considered By United States Congress

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 7.—Following the defeat of Speaker Garner's repeal measure on Monday, new plans are being made to push a beer bill through the Senate and House at the present short session of Congress.

The Senate judiciary committee now has under consideration a bill for the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment and modification of the Volstead Act. The bill contains an anti-saloon clause.

It is likely that a bill will be considered by the House of Representatives to provide for the sale of beer and light wines with a tax of \$5 per barrel on beer and 10c per gallon on wine.

DESTROYER UPTURNED

TOKYO, Dec. 7.—The Japanese destroyer Sawarabi was drifting upside down in the east of the China Sea yesterday with 104 men of her crew probably drowned.

NEW ERA OF EXPANSION FOR MINING PREDICTED BY DISTRICT ENGINEER

British Columbia Due to Establish Metal Making Industry in Addition to Producing Raw Material—Prince Rupert's Local Advantages

"A great expansion along new lines is due for the mining industry of this country," declared Dr. J. T. Mandy, resident mining engineer, in speaking before the Gyo Club yesterday. "Canada's metal production far exceeds its consumption. We have prolific mineral resources, both developed and undeveloped, but we have not as yet established a metal-making industry of international significance."

"A new era is dawning for the Canadian mining industry. In this, British Columbia is destined to play an important role. Prince Rupert, too, is bound to play an important part in this development, providing it is on the qui vive and makes its facilities and advantages known."

"We need not worry on the score of production of raw materials. What we need now is the production of finished, processed or manufactured products from these raw materials. But, above all, we must have real salesmen to sell the goods. Let us sell our mining industry to ourselves and to the world. I urge you to become 'mining conscious.'"

Canadian Softwoods to Be Used in Great Britain in Preference to European

LONDON, Dec. 7.—Announcement was made in the House of Commons yesterday that Canadian softwoods are to be used in place of European woods in all major building contracts that come under the supervision of the Commissioner of Works.

W. Grimsby Gore, Commissioner of Works, told the House that he had been advised that there would shortly be available supplies of Canadian products that would be used for carpentry, internal joinery and general building purposes.

Fate of Sandbeach is Still Uncertain; May Have Been Blown Up

Seven Additional Corpses Are Found in Bay of St. George, Newfoundland—Twenty-Five in All Believed to Have Perished

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 7.—Several additional bodies from the ill-fated steamer Sandbeach, which is believed to have been wrecked off the coast of Newfoundland, were found on the shores of the Bay of St. George today. So far, seven bodies have been recovered, twenty-five members of the ship's crew having supposedly lost their lives. Whether the steamer was wrecked during the week-end gale or blown up by a store of gun cotton she had on board has not yet been ascertained.

STEAMER MISSING

Lifeboat Bearing Name "Sandbeach" Washed Ashore With Body of Dead Sailor

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 7.—Wireless operators combed the North Atlantic Tuesday for word of the steamer Sandbeach. It left Cornerbrook for Halifax December 2 and has not been reported since. Fears for the safety of her crew of about 25 were expressed when a message was received Tuesday by the government that stated that a lifeboat bearing the steamer's name and containing the body of a dead sailor had been washed up on shore 12 miles west of Highlands, West St. George.

CANNERY IS DEMOLISHED

Wreckers Have Completed Work on Old Tucks Inlet Plant in Prince Rupert Harbor

Wreckers have completed the work of tearing down the old Prince Rupert cannery in Tucks Inlet, Prince Rupert Harbor. The buildings were recently sold for the lumber and other material which was in them, the wharf and plant generally having been in a state of disrepair for some considerable time.

The Tucks Inlet cannery was originally built by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. by which concern it was operated for some years. Ten years or so ago, it was sold to the interests which now form the B. C. Packers. It is years since the cannery has been operated.

Aged Farmer of Aleza Lake Was Buried Recently

PRINCE GEORGE, Dec. 7.—The funeral took place last Thursday afternoon of Charles Stewart, a pioneer of the Aleza Lake district, who passed away a few days previous. Deceased was 79 years of age and, until his last illness, had been engaged in farming in the vicinity of Aleza Lake.

LEAGUE IS IN CRISIS

Assembly Now in Session Dealing With Vexed Question of Manchuria

GENEVA, Dec. 7.—Faced with the greatest crisis in its history, the assembly of the League of Nations is now in session to consider the Lytton report and decide whether Manchuria is to be given back to China or whether it shall remain the so-called independent state of Manchukuo under Japanese control.

Japan has protested vigorously against the Lytton report and against its consideration by the League. What transpires will probably determine whether or not Japan shall withdraw from the League as she has threatened to do.

President-Elect Back in Albany

Governor Roosevelt Leaves South After Two Weeks' Stay at Warm Springs

JERSEY CITY, Dec. 7.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, after a two weeks' holiday at Warm Springs, Georgia, arrived here by special train last night enroute back to Albany where a special session of the New York State Legislature will open on Friday.

British Pound and Canadian Dollar on New York Exchange

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Showing a gain of 1/8c over the day previous, the British pound sterling closed at \$3.19 3/4 on the local foreign exchange yesterday. The Canadian dollar closed at 85c.

AMY JOHNSON TO TRY FOR NEW FLIGHT MARK
