Sport Chat

The French outdoor 1923 athletic season has just closed and, in the absence of startling performances by newcomers coupled with the necessity of relying upon Antwerp veterans, the outlook for a French Olympic victory in the 100 and 200 metre distances next year is acknowledged by the French Olympic committee and leaders of the French Athletic Federation as being very gloomy. In view of this situation, the French are bending every effort to train men for the longer distances, 5,000 and 10,000 metres and Marathon, in which they hope to make a better showing.

The middleweight boxing championship of Alaska will be decided in a bout to be staged at Ketchikan next Thursday evening, Thanksgiving Day, between "Red" Campbell and Mickey Prescott, the sailor. Both men are now in the midst of training. Prescott is said to have outpointed and outboxed every man he has met so far and Campbell has a record behind him along the Pacific Coast that entitles him to serious consideration. For some time in Ketchikan sporting circles there has been considerable comment and finger betting on the respective merits of the two principals and according to those who should know the result will be a toss-up as far as records are concerned.
