## MOTOR AND WIRELESS EXHIBITION IN LONDON

LONDON, Nov. 23.—Of the five exhibitions which have just opened here, the Motor Show, at the Olympia, is the most important, drawing some quarter of a million of the world's keenest motorists to see ten acres of the world's finest cars, value about £1,000,000. The All-British Wireless Exhibition at the White City is the largest wireless show ever held. Last year people had hardly heard of broadcasting; this year about one private suburban house in every three sports an aerial, and over 200,000 "constructor's licenses" held by the amateurs who make, or partly make their own apparatus, have been issued. It is therefore not surprising to learn that the exhibits at this year's wireless exhibition occupy three times the area filled last year, or that at least 120,000 visitors are expected, as compared with 35,000 in 1922.

## W.C.T.U. SECRETARY WOULD LIKE TO HAVE DOMINION PROHIBITION



## COPPER PRICES ARE DUE FOR A RISE IN VERY NEAR FUTURE

WELLESLEY HILLS, Mass., Nov. 23.—Copper securities at a new low point for the year, reached during the last two weeks, have stirred the interest of the investor. After a survey of the industry Roger W. Babson, the statistician, issued a report of his findings:

"The copper industry has for some time been rolling in the doldrums of low prices and depressed market conditions," says Mr. Babson. "From August, 1921, throughout 1922 and into the first quarter of this year, prices moved steadily upward, in March a temporary reaction set in and during the past seven months the trend has been markedly downward. Present quotations are on a par with those of the early part of 1922.

"All indications point to the fact that the stage is being set for a long-awaited buying movement. Nearly every appreciable upward turn in prices has been directly preceded by an abrupt drop in shipments from the refineries to domestic mills. In September domestic deliveries were only 93,000,000 pounds, the lowest since early in 1922 and over 30,000,000 pounds below the average point for the first eight months of this year.

"Copper buying has always come in waves. Psychology enters the market in a persistent tendency to follow the crowd, and is often the deciding factor in the direction and extent of a price movement. Another indication of approaching strength is the length and extent of the declining market. Since no halt in the fall of copper prices. A study of market fluctuations for the past 15 years shows that six months is the maximum limit of a continued price trend.

## SURPLUS OF TEACHERS IN MANITOBA: SHORTAGE SASKATCHEWAN PROV.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 23.—For the first time on record Manitoba has a surplus of teachers, 709 having already been placed. The opposite condition prevails in Saskatchewan. There the Bureau has from fifty to sixty applications that cannot be filled. Of the students at the overcrowded Normal Schools in Manitoba it may be noted that a very small percentage are men.
