OMINECA IS BUSY

Three Large Placer Operations Will Be in Production Here Next Spring, Says McCorkell

VANCOUVER, Dec. 7: — Next spring three of the largest placer gold mining operations in British Columbia will be in production in the Omineca district, R. C. McCorkell, veteran mining man of that area, has reported to the British Columbia Chamber of Mines. These are enterprises of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co., Omineca Placers Ltd. and Germansen Placer Ltd. All three are located near Slate Creek.

Germansen Placer Ltd., a hydraulic operation, has been engaged for two years in the construction of a nine-mile ditch and flume. It reached production this fall in ample time before the freeze-up in October to satisfy the owners that values will prove profitable. There is gravel in sight for many years.

Omineca Placers Ltd. is establishing a steam drag-line and will be ready for production by spring. Operation of the Consolidated is a large steam drag-line. The Consolidated property is situated about 150 miles from the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway line. About 100 miles of road has been built by the government during the past years and the Consolidated is building the remaining fifty miles itself.

In addition to these larger operations, many individuals engaged in work in the district during the year, some being successful in placer operations, Mr. McCorkell reports.

DALE PITT IS IN CITY

General Manager of Premier Going North After Presiding Over Mining Convention

After a trip to Vancouver where he presided last week over the annual convention of the Mining Association of British Columbia of which he is president, Dale L. Pitt, general manager of the Premier Gold Mining Co., is a passenger on board the Prince Rupert today returning to Premier. The convention, Mr. Pitt reports, was a highly successful gathering, the attendance having been exceptionally large. Keen interest was taken in the deliberations and especially in a number of fine papers which were read.

Mr. Pitt confirms previous announcements of the letting of the contract by his company to a Vancouver firm for supply of new cable to be installed on the Premier tram line and in regard to the transformation of Premier mine into an all-milling operation. "Operations are proceeding normally at the mine," Mr. Pitt states.

ALL-BRAN CORN BREAD

Two eggs (beaten slightly), ¼ cup sugar, ½ cup all-bran, 1 cup corn meal, 1 cup milk, ¾ cup flour, ¼ teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons baking powder, ¼ pound bacon (diced).

Combine eggs and sugar thoroughly; add all-bran, corn meal and milk. Sift dry ingredients together, add to first mixture and pour into greased-baking dish (9x12 inches is a suitable size). Sprinkle bacon over top. Bake at 400 degrees F. for 20 minutes, then slip pan under broiler for about three minutes to brown the crust and to crisp the bacon.

Yield: 16 servings.

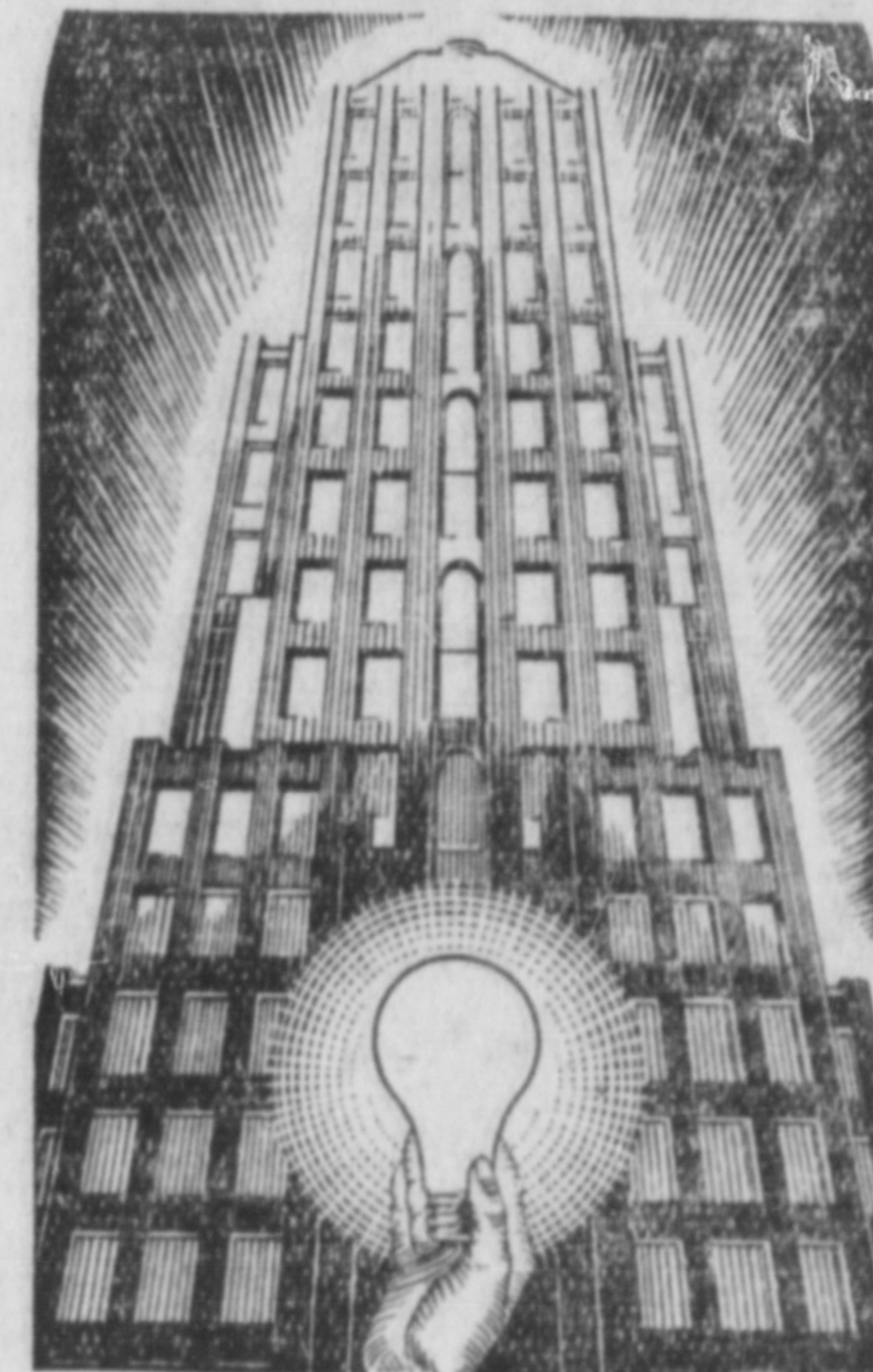
