COMMUNITY LEAGUE MEETING AT ANYOX

Smelter Town Ball Teams Going Stewart July 1; Victoria Day Celebration Plans

ANYOX, May 23.—The regular weekly meeting of the Community League council was attended by President Lewis, Vice-president Callanan, Sec. Treas. Townshend, Counsellors Mrs. Dwyer, Mrs. Cloke, Messrs. Blaney and Simpson.

The secretary's report stated that an order had been issued for repairs to the footbridge across the creek at the Flats.

No answer had been received from the Alice Arm Hotel in reply to letter asking for accommodation there during the coming summer.

Arrangements had been made for the management of the Granby Co. for the transportation of baseball and football players.

The Elks have cancelled the night of May 23 as a dance night in Recreation Hall.

Mr. Miller, who had accepted the position as groundsman for the summer at the ball park, has already resigned, not having the time necessary to do the work properly.

A wire had been sent to Canadian Westinghouse Company at Vancouver and a reply had been received giving prices of fans suitable to Recreation Hall. The wire stated that a 26 1/2 inch wheel diameter complete would cost \$170.85, and a 32 inch wheel fan would cost \$245 at Vancouver. Fan could be shipped right away. The council decided that the matter of getting the most suitable fan be left with the Granby engineer, Mr. Geary.

Improving Grounds

Mr. Simpson called the attention of the council to the dangerous nature of the football goal posts, and asked that new posts be purchased. The matter of greater seating accommodation at the ball grounds was also discussed. Mrs. Cloke suggested that the league supply the lumber and call for a construction bee to erect the additional bleachers. It was finally decided that this work should be undertaken and carried to completion by the league.
