Rise Likely Real Estate

Local Dealers Receiving Many Inquiries from Outside and Number of Transactions Made Recently

The large number of inquiries that are being received by real estate dealers from outside investors establishes the belief that the tide is about to turn from the period of low prices that has prevailed for the past few years and that the market will soon be on the rise. While there have been a number of transactions recently, the inclination of property holders now seems to be one of holding on. There have been cases this summer of property being sold at higher prices than it was offered earlier in the year.

The municipal tax sale last week was closely watched and several people picked up property for investment purposes. It is likely that, if the real estate market rises as it seems likely it will, that the city authorities will attempt to discontinue the policy of selling at the upset prices and will demand higher prices more commensurate with the market trend.

FORT NORMAN CLOSED TIGHT

CALGARY, Alta., Oct. 8.—When the deep-toned whistle of the big steamboat "Distributor," formerly operated on the Skeena River out of Prince Rupert during G.T.P. construction days, blew a sonorous blast on August 29 last, 53 miles below Fort Norman on the Mackenzie river, the million dollar three-year northern adventure of the Imperial Oil, Ltd., came to an end. all the camp paraphernalia, a score or more of men—drillers, tool dressers, firemen and mechanics, dog teams, half breed helpers, everybody right down to the camp cats and all outward bound.

Today the formerly busy oil camps at the edge of the Arctic Circle stand deserted.

The men, under the leadership of Dr. W. A. Richardson, of Vancouver, who was in charge of the medical work and health supervision at the camps, reached Calgary from Edmonton on Sept. 15, and dispersed to various destinations throughout Canada and the United States.

Future Plans Unknown

No one, not even the local officials of the Imperial Oil, Ltd., know the future plans of the big company with regard to its far north search for oil. But this is the first year since the northern drive started in 1920 that the camps have been entirely abandoned in the winter. Whether the drilling will ever be resumed is a matter that probably has not even been decided by the eastern directors themselves. At any rate, no oil has been struck except the original "Discovery" well on the right bank of the Mackenzie River, about 58 miles north of Fort Norman, and just about 100 miles from the Arctic Circle.

Two other deep wells were drilled and came in "dry." They were located on Bear Island, just opposite the "Discovery" well and at "C" camp on the opposite or left bank of the big river.

Loss to Far North

The closing of the camps and particularly the departure of Dr. Richardson, will be a great loss to the far north. Dr. Richardson stationed at Fort Norman, some 900 miles north along the river from Fort Smith, the northern boundary of Alberta, was the only doctor in that vast stretch of territory reaching on beyond there for another 500 miles to Herschel Island in the Arctic. All the medical and surgical cases up and down the river from Fort Norman outside of the company employees were brought to him for attention and he had a great deal of work to do which kept him busy.

SACKS ARE CARRIED BY EX-POLICEMEN

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—Stories of the theft of steaks and bonds by immature youths, which a few years ago vied for frontpage positions in the daily newspapers, appear only infrequently now.

The answer is found in the almost universal absence of boys and young men in the roles of runners and messengers for the investment houses of lower Broadway, Wall and Broad Streets. The small satchels and portfolios containing valuable securities which constantly are being exchanged between investment houses no longer are entrusted to beardless boys. Instead husky men, the majority veterans of the New York police and fire department, have been employed as messengers.

PREMIER TAKES SHOT AT BOWSER

Says Made Misstatements in Regard to Travelling Expenses When at Rupert

VICTORIA, Oct. 10.—Premier Oliver returned to the Parliament Buildings yesterday and plunged into work preparatory to the opening of the session at the end of the month. He took occasion to make a slashing attack on W. J. Bowser, leader of the opposition, in connection with travelling expenses. "Mr. Bowser," declared Mr. Oliver, "while in the north told the people of Prince Rupert he was giving them several days of his valuable time free and that he was travelling at his own expense. This," said the premier, "was one of the grossest misstatements I have ever known Mr. Bowser to make. He is not travelling at his own expense but as leader of the opposition. He is given a grant every year by the country of \$2,000 to cover travelling expenses. During the past six years my expenses to the country for travelling have been but \$6,000 whereas in the same period his have been \$12,000."

ROUGH WEATHER ON FISH BANKS

Schooner Republic Lost Some Gear and Men Narrowly Escaped Being Washed Overboard

Particularly rough weather on the halibut banks is reported by incoming fishing schooners. This has mitigated against good fishing and the catches are short in most cases. The schooner Republic, Capt. Hegge, arriving today, lost some gear while coming in and some of her men had narrow escapes from being swept overboard while trying to save it.


