

## Vancouver Branch of Royal Bank Held Up and Bandit is Again Captured by Manager

VANCOUVER, Dcc. 8:-George E. Devereaux, manager of the Sixteenth Avenue and Oak Street branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, boarded a street car yesterday and captured at the point of a gun a well-dressed young man who had just held up his bank and taken \$276 from the teller on the threat that he would blow the place up with nitro-glycerine if he did not "come across."

The lone bandit, who gave his name as Harold Knight, aged 24, was covered with the manager's pistol and held by Devereaux in the street car until police arrived and took him in custody. He is being charged with robbery with violence.

Devereaux gave chase to the bandit as he left the bank and caught up with him as he boarded a Marpole street car which had just rounded the corner.

It was the third time this year that this branch of the bank had been held up and the second occasion on which Devereaux made a bandit capture. The other hold-ups took place in June and November.
