### TUG POINT HOPE IN SWANSON BAY FERRY SERVICE TO RUPERT

Whalen Company Making Regular Shipments Three Times a Week—300 Tons Each Trip

The tug Point Hope, belonging to the Marpole Towing Co. of Vancouver, arrived in port this morning from Swanson Bay with the Whalen Pulp & Paper Co.'s car barge in tow. The Point Hope will engage in this service for the next month while the regular tug Bermuda is undergoing boiler and engine repairs in Vancouver. Capt. Stannard, one of the members of the Marpole Towing Co., is in command.

The Whalen company is now making steady shipments by car ferry to Prince Rupert for shipment East over the Canadian National Railways. The transfer averages three trips a week and each time nine cars are brought representing about 300 tons of pulp and lumber.

Capt. Stannard is well-known here but the tug Point Hope has never been here before.

### SAN FRANCISCO GIRLS MAY DRESS LIKE MEN

Ordinance Passed Giving Them Right to Male Attire as Long As No Deception

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—The women and girls of San Francisco may now wear trousers, pantaloons, breeches, trunks, spatterdashers, gamashes, knickerbockers, bloomers or pants on the streets here without fear of arrest or official disapproval. For many years thousands of trouser-clad girls have filled the down-town streets, cars and ferries on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. These ladies, young and old, have heretofore faced arrest, but the Board of Supervisors has now passed an ordinance permitting girls to wear male attire, providing there is no intent to deceive.

Daniel J. O'Brien, chief of police, was behind the move to amend the ordinance. "The new ordinance," said the chief, "was put through for the benefit of hikers. Girls can't hike in dresses."

Chief O'Brien stood near the ferry and watched a group of hikers file past. One or two agile and sprightly nymph-like figures passed, but when several ladies whose figures might be described as emboupoint personified, passed, the chief added: "The ordinance distinctly says 'where there is no intent to deceive,' and, in most cases, I'm sure there can be no deception."

### LABOR PARTY WISHES BUSINESS HOURS FOR HOUSE OF COMMONS

A change in parliamentary habits is being advocated by some members of the Labor party, says the London Times. They propose that the House of Commons should meet at noon every day and adjourn about 7 o'clock. Such a change in the time table, it is feared, would have an injurious effect on the character of the House. It would tend to turn the whole of the members into a class of professional parliamentarians—the last men to whom alone the country could with confidence entrust the making and administration of its laws and

the control of its finance. There are, and must be, professional politicians in the House as it stands—but they are leavened, to the manifest gain of the House, as a debating and voting chamber by an admixture of professional and business men and others whose interests are not exclusively confined to politics. If the hours were changed so that the whole of the normal working day was taken up by their parliamentary duties, these members would be obliged to choose absolutely between Westminster and their other occupations. As it is, they are able to combine the two and to bring into the council of the nation a variety of experience in practical affairs.
