FINE BASEBALL GAME AT ANYOX

Smelter Won Over Mine by Score of 3 to 2 in First Match of Season

ANYOX, May 19.—An overflow crowd passed into the ball grounds from all directions on the opening night of the Anyox Baseball League, and saw the Smelter team annex the first scheduled game of the season, winning over the Mine by a score of 3 to 2. From the moment when Dr. Learoyd, president of the league, tossed the first ball across the plate, the boys put up a fine exhibition of the game. It was much better than anyone expected for a beginning and in fact the brand of ball was more of the mid-season variety. The game was won and lost in the very first inning, the Mine getting one run on their first time at bat, while the Smelter got three across the home plate on their half of the same frame. After that, although on one or two occasions there seemed to be good chance for the Smelter to add a few more to the team's total, no runner reached home.

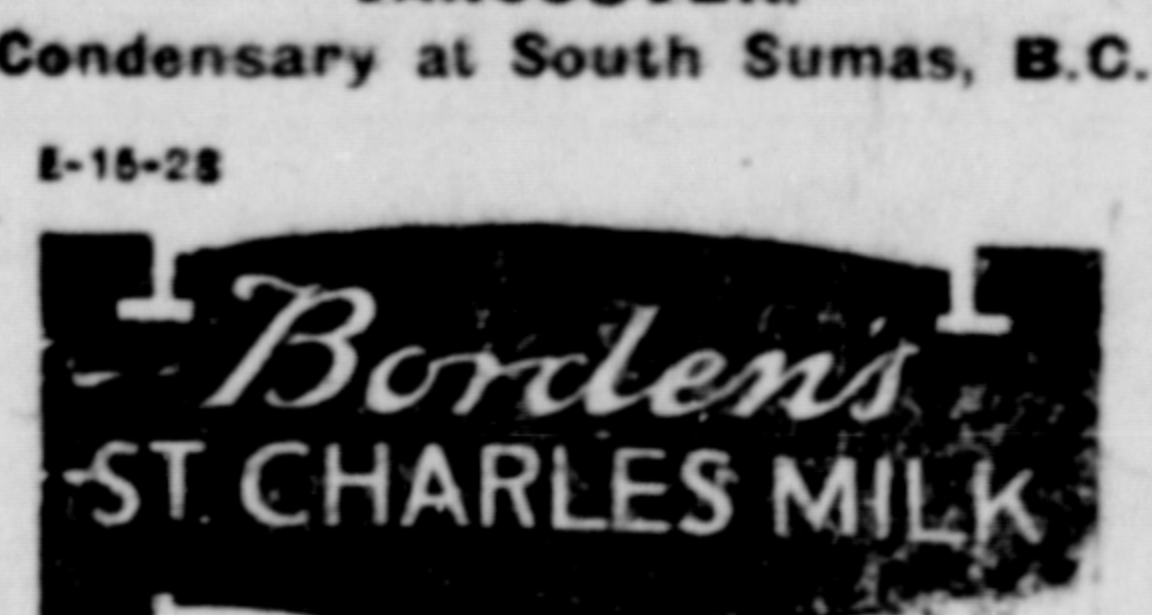

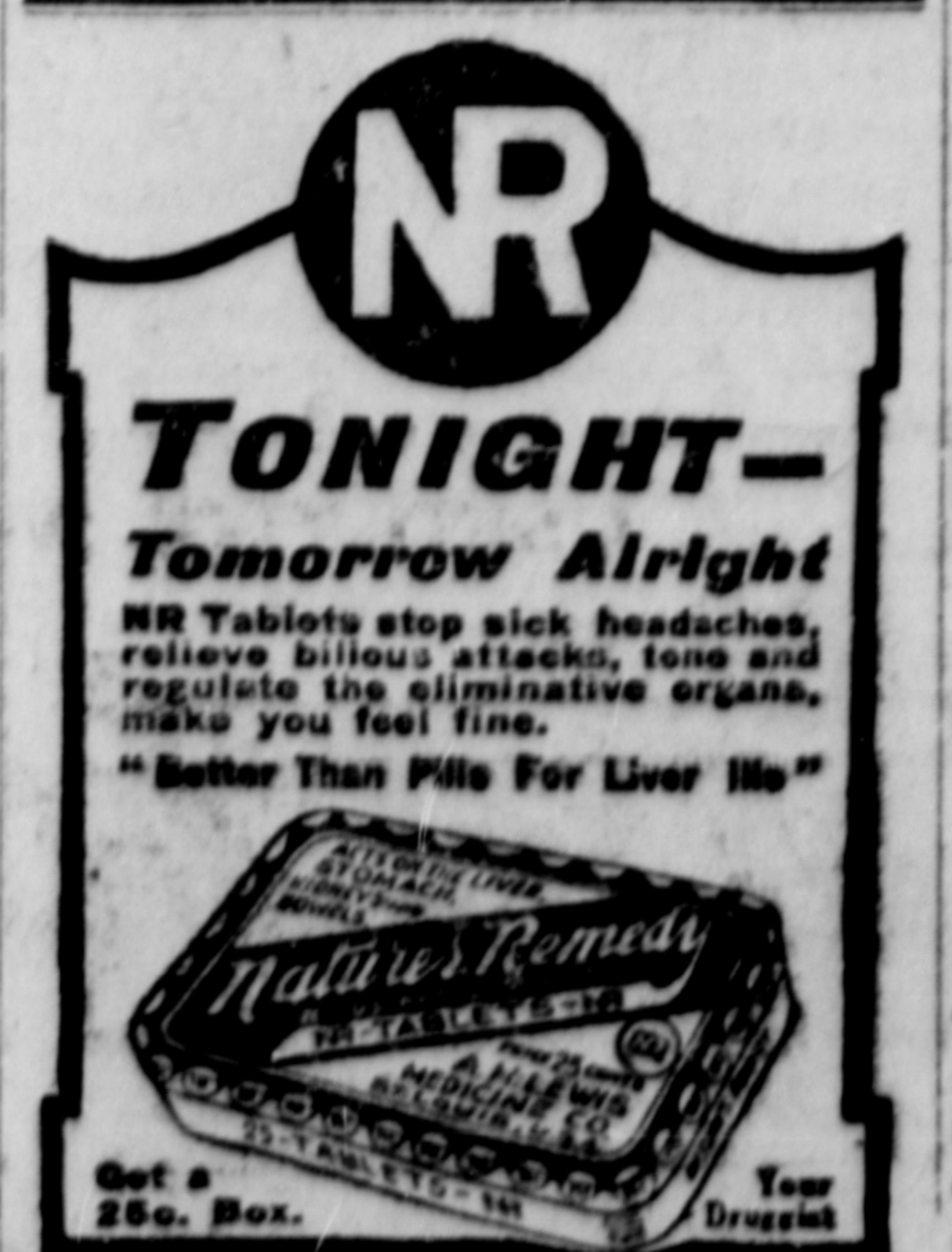
SMELTER FOOTBALL TEAM DEFEATS MINE ANYOX LEAGUE GAME

Sixteen balloons are expected to start, among them several from the army and navy, in the United States national balloon race to be held in Indianapolis on July 4. For the first time definite rules have been set down for the race. A specially built balloon, in which helium gas will probably be used, is to be entered by the navy. The contest is sponsored by the National Aeronautic Association of which R. Russell Shaw, of Washington, D.C., is the chairman. Albert von Lambert, internationally known balloonist from St. Louis, will be the referee.
