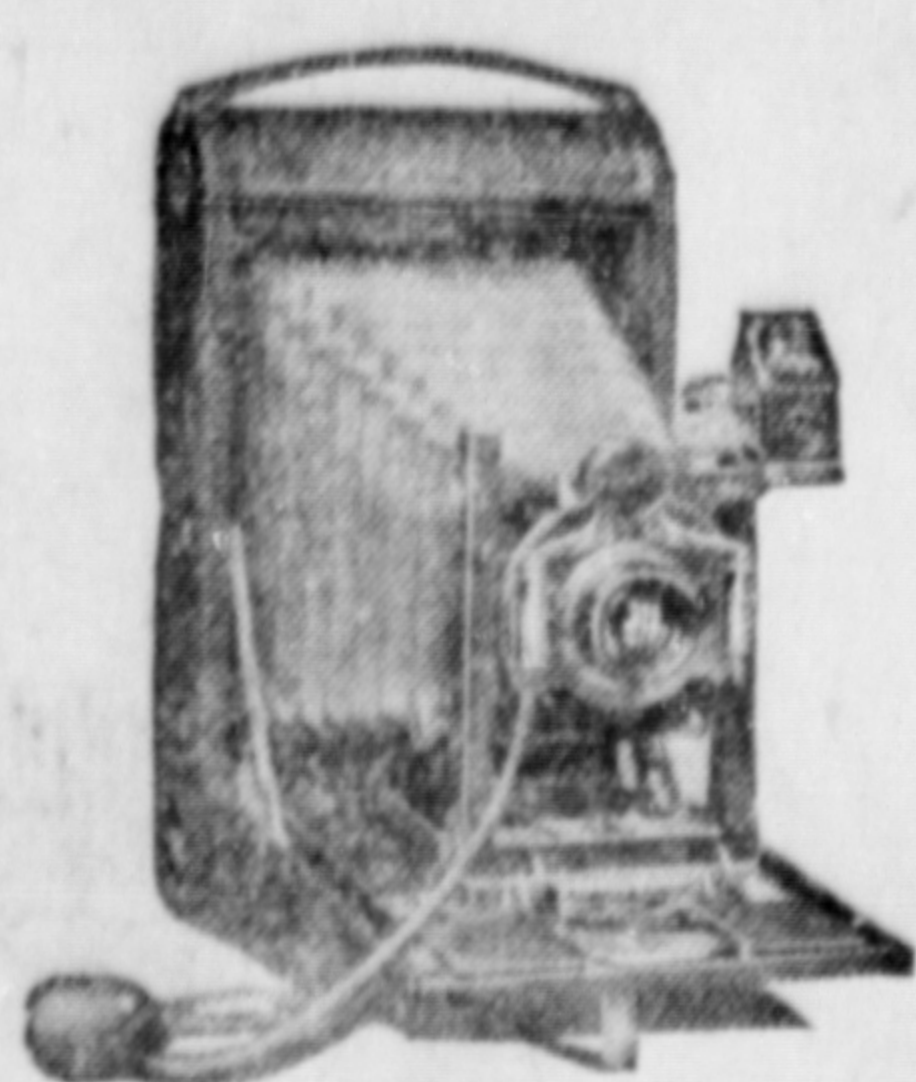

KELLY DOUGLAS IS CLOSING OUT HERE

Vancouver Wholesale Firm Will
Discontinue Operation of
Branch Warehouse on
May 1

With a view to closing out the
branch warehouse in Prince Rup-
ert, the wholesale company of
Kelly-Douglas, Ltd. have can-
celled the lease of their building
with the Grand Trunk Pacific
Railway Co.

Announcement to this effect
was made this morning by C. G.
Mills, manager, who said that
the move had been contemplated
for some time. There is still a
chance, however, that if general
business conditions should im-
prove to warrant it, the company
would continue to carry on. In
any case, the district will be
taken care of with a representa-
tive making headquarters here.

The Kelly-Douglas Co. has
been in business here for about
ten years and a staff of seven is
employed. How many of this
staff will move south or who will
be the representative remaining
has not yet been decided.
