SUGGESTIONS ARE MADE TO DITCH MEIGHEN AS CONSERVATIVE LEADER

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—"It may sound absurd, but the opinion is being expressed even within the ranks of the Conservative party that Premier Howard Ferguson of Ontario may be the next prime minister of Canada," says the Citizen, editorially.

"More than the purchase of ice cream for the little Quebecers will be required of Mr. Ferguson before he can break the solid sixty-five members who sit together on what is called the Liberal side of the House. But it is quite possible that with the assistance of Robert Rogers and the memorizing of one speech in the French language he might command himself as a likely winner to the commissariat department of the Conservative party in Montreal.

Currie Mentioned

"Sir Arthur Currie's name is sometimes mentioned, but Sir Arthur gives no hint of being ambitious to lead party cohorts with a wooden sword in the cardboard battle of politics."

The editorial continues: "The schemers who are hunting to discover a new premier and leader to groom for the Dominion premiership would perhaps be really of use to Canada if they were to relieve Mr. Meighen of his present position. As Conservative party leader he is lost to the country. He has talents and courage that would be of great service to the Canadian people.

"There would be greater public confidence in Mr. Meighen as a national leader, however, if he were to make a break with reaction himself, rather than wait until the schemers displace him."

LIQUOR TRAFFIC IS DOOMED SAYS NELLIE

Famous Writer Tells Victorians Her Views on What is Vital Question in Alberta Today

VICTORIA, B.C., October 23.—"Anything that brings so much misery and trouble to the world as the liquor traffic is bound to go. It has been found to be contributing cause of so much of the suffering of the world. Some evil conditions are subtle and their origin is difficult to fix, but it is never difficult to put your finger on the woe which find their source in the liquor traffic."

Mrs. Nellie McClung, one of the champions of temperance who has lent her voice and pen on countless occasions to the cause, is in Victoria for a time. She will be speaking here this week under the auspices of the ladies of the Metropolitan Church. As she is nursing her husband through his convalescence after a serious illness it is rather doubtful if she will be able to get back to Alberta in time to participate in the fight which is to take place in that province on November 5, when a referendum on the liquor question is to take place there.

Liquor Organized

"The liquor interests are very strongly organized," she said when asked how the issue appeared to be going. But while this element is putting up a strong campaign, the temperance people, too, she says, are working very hard. The press she thinks very fair. They are publishing without bias reports on both sides of the campaign. Editorially the leading newspapers seem to be on the side of prohibition, notably The Calgary Albertan and The Edmonton Bulletin. The women's societies throughout the province are solidly for prohibition, and as the women's vote is a large one it should count heavily if they all use their franchise privileges on this occasion, as only about 20 per cent of the women (who are non-club women are known to stand on the side of the moder-

Seen on Trial

"Prohibition has been put on trial. Because it did not accomplish everything at once, many people have wanted to try something else, to experiment with a change. We are, in fact, suffering from a period of reaction. The war hastened prohibition, and some people think it was brought in without weighty enough consideration. Personally, I think the liquor traffic is doomed. We may lose a single engagement in our battle, but we are not going to lose the fight in the long run. Looking back over a period of twenty-five years, no one could gainsay the advance which has been made in public sentiment on the question. And the future would surely build up rather than break down that feeling."


