RUHR FEELS MONEY PINCH

Farmers Refuse to Sell Food and Staples Unobtainable-Riots Possi-

DUSSELDORF, Aug. 1. -The effect of last week's fall in the exchange value of the mark is beginning to appear in a pronounced food shortage throughout the Ruhr Valley. Farmers are refusing to exchange good potatoes for badly depreciated money and staples are almost unobtainable at any price. The situation has become so acute that food riots are thought to be possible.
