ORE BODY IS DISCOVERED

Mine Shows Ten Dunwell Feet Solid Carrying Good Values

STEWART, B.C., July 21 -The north and south vein encountered at 280 feet in the Number Two tunnel of the Dunwell mine on Glacier Creek, Bear River, has been crosscut for seventy feet, the last ten feet being in solid ore carrying good values in gold, silver and lead.

The finding of the body of ore in this mine has caused a good deal of excitement here and will give encouragement to other owners of properties to continue development. Being on Bear River and only a few miles from here, the town will benefit much more than from the development of the properties on the Salmon River.

Work is proceeding on a number of other properties and the revival of interest in Bear River is one of the hopeful signs of the Portland Canal mining development.
