Rockwell is an astute campaigner and is possessed keen political judgment. He was pre-convention leader of the James M. Cox campaign in 1920. Cox won the Democratic nomination, but was defeated in the election by Warren G. Harding, the Republican nominee. The Ohio leader set the stage carefully for his presentation of McAdoo. He spent several months in canvassing the sentiment of party leaders in various States. Then he arranged for a delegation of prominent Democrats to wait upon McAdoo and urge him to announce his candidacy for the nomination. Mc-Adoo demanded time to satisfy himself that his services were really required by his party. While he was presumably struggling with this problem, Rockwell came out with his "one depends upon the srengtth more than forty States.

In the Democratic convention a two-thirds vote of the delegates is necessary to win the Presidential nomination. There will be 1.094 delegates to the 1924 convention, which means that McAdoo will need 730 to win. Conversely, Tammany and its allies will need 365 to prevent him from winning. Whether they can secure this preventive blue and hold it solid at the convention is a matter of no ; little speculation at the present

time. Just before the convention opened he wired several of the party leaders that he did not want the nomination. Nevertheless he enfered the convention a big favor-CONTAINS lite and persisted so in all of the learly ballots. He had 266 votes on the first ballot and rose by various stages to 160 on the forty-first, his highest point. Delegates controlled by Tammy and Company opposed him throughout the voting, and his defeat was generally attributed to this opposition.

PRE-EMPTIONS Vacant, unreserved, surveyed

Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age. and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series. 'How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge y addressing the Department of ands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Govrnment Agent. .

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are o be addressed to the Land Con missioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland. for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) and \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands." Mill, factory, or industrial sites on

timber land, not exceeding 40 acres. may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage. HOMESITE LEASES Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20

acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and imprevement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.


