# YEARS IN TRANSIT

Amundsen Posted in Far North Is Delivered

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 26 .- Four years ago Roald Amundsen, the explorer, mailed a letter in the far north to a friend in Minneapolis. After various adventures the communication reached its destination a few days ago, bearing on its face an epic of the postal service at the world's

Eskimo carriers and dog teams. who started with the letter, had succumbed to cold and starvation, and their mail pouch lay for nearly four years preserved by ice and snow until last summer, when a party of Russians discovered it. They sent the letter to Amundsen's home in Norway, where his brother, Leon, forwarded it to the Minneapolis destina-
