RAISE \$10,000 FOR CAMPAIGN

Meeting of Eighty Businessmen in Victoria Passes Resolution For Prohibition

VICTORIA, March 20. — "Huge sums of money" are being "diverted from the channels of trade" and sent out of British Columbia under the present system of government liquor control which is "crippling industry and impoverishing the homes of our people and depriving women and children of the necessities of life."

This is the charge made in a strongly-worded resolution demanding the re-enactment of prohibition, and passed at a meeting of about eighty business men in the Chamber of Commerce Rooms under the auspices of the Prohibition party, with Rev. William Stevenson in the chair. Passage of this resolution followed an address by Rev. A. E. Cooke, president of the British Columbia Prohibition Association, who announced plans for an extensive campaign to bring back prohibition in this province.

The resolution, proposed by Arthur Lee, seconded by ex-Mayor William Marchant and passed by the businessmen, follows:

The Resolution
Resolved that this meeting of Victoria business men views with grave apprehension the extensive sales of alcoholic liquors under the system of government sale prevailing in British Columbia.

"We strongly condemn the obvious efforts of the Liquor Control Board to increase such sales by keeping open the government stores on the Wednesday half holiday and upon hours after ordinary business hours are closed; and by opening 63 liquor stores to supply our population of 223,369 as contrasted with the province of Saskatchewan, which under government sale opened 23

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-occupied.

Partnership pre-emption abolished but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption.

30th joint resolution, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1/2 acre.

Where pre-emptor in occupation unless than 5 years, and has made improvements, he may, by reason of ill-health, or other cause, transfer intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$250 per acre and records same each year.

Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in connection with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

MIL factories or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased on conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads, and by means of a conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The right which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING
Grading Act, 1913, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

Evils of Traffic
"We call upon all the business men and generally upon all the citizens of the province to support the British Columbia Prohibition Association in its efforts to make known the enormous evil effects of the liquor traffic in British Columbia and strongly urge the repeal of the Government Liquor Act and the re-enactment of a Prohibition Act as the best means of restoring normal conditions of trade in British Columbia."

British Columbia under so-called "moderation" has become the Mecca for liquor outlaws, gunmen and undesirable from all over North America until its reputation "stinks in the nostrils" of decent Americans. Mr. Cooke said in his address. He announced that a campaign fund of \$10,000 was being raised in British Columbia this year for the purpose of bringing about a new liquor referendum. This, he said, would give the people a chance to scrap the present liquor system and re-institute prohibition. If prohibitionists could get the facts of the present situation before the people prohibition would be re-enacted, he believed. Mr. Cooke said that \$2,000 had been set as Victoria's quota of the \$10,000 campaign fund and asked businessmen here to contribute this money.

Two Millions on Liquor
Two million dollars which should be spent on merchandise is being spent on liquor in the province every month now, Mr. Cooke declared. He said that in the first fifteen and a half months of government control the government sold \$10,605,309 worth of liquor and received besides \$188,604 for liquor permits, or roughly \$10,000,000.

"Putting the government into the liquor business bids fair to put the merchants out of business altogether sooner or later," he declared. He quoted a well-known commercial traveller to the effect that present liquor sales were hurting business. Where there were liquor stores commercial orders were cut, he said. Ninety-seven out of every hundred commercial travellers would vote for prohibition now, according to Mr. Cooke's information.

Mr. Cooke said he had been told by a professional man "on the inside" that seventy-five per cent of the business men of Vancouver would quit business if they were forced to pay their arrears of taxes and rent. It was time that business men began to realize that people's money was being spent on liquor instead of the necessities of life.

"If you business men want to restore prosperity, get up on your hind legs and see that this system is abolished in spite of every politician and the wet press of this country," he urged.
