Skipper Lost Fingers and Toes

When Captain Howard Black- vorable. burn, well known to many Maritime fishermen here, died at the age of 9:30 p.m. until 2 a.m. and refresh- 74 in Gloucester, stories of his seagoing days were recounted not only in the Massachussetts town of his adoption but along the Medway Commercial travellers in Hungary River in Nova Scotia, where he was known as a boy.

> Howard Blackburn is best known for his feats of crossing the Atlantic twice alone. But not the least thrilling of the stories about him is the simple record of how he lost seum has been opened in Laucha, his toes and fingers in a great exhibition of fortitude at sea.

It was on a bitterly cold night of January 25, 1883, that Blackburn and Thomas Welch, his dorymate, were lost from the Gloucester fisherman Grace F. Fears, the dory drifting past the schooner in a flurry of snow.

Darkness came on and the wind shifted from northeast to northwest bringing high seas in its wake. Abandoning all hope of reaching the schooner, the two men headed

west. 'All that night and the next day they rowed. Snow fell and high seas sent showers of spray into their dory, to drench them and freeze where it fell. On the second night

Welch died. Blackburn kept on at the oars. He knew that his hands were freezing and that, if he relinquished his hold to bail out the dory, he would,




