WAR PRISONER IN GERMANY

Charles V. Eviitt Tells of His Experiences Among Boche at Various Camps

At the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday Charles V. Eviitt told of several years he spent in German detention camps as a prisoner of war. He was attached to the Eighth Middlesex Regiment and was taken prisoner when raiding a German trench opposite Arras at three o'clock in the morning. He was interrogated by officers and put in a room in the Banque de France. It was the first taste of German hospitality for the blankets he was given were fairly alive and when he complained he was blamed for having made the blankets lousy.

Every day he was interrogated. Then he was told he was to see some friends and on being taken to a room he saw Capt. Strange and Lieut. Durham, both of whom turned their backs on him. When the guards had retired he was quietly told by them that there was a listening apparatus right overhead, so they began to talk and told what they would do if they ever got a chance at the Boche. Also they filled the German up with the strength of the allies and what would happen if they were attacked.

At Karlsruhe

At Karlsruhe they joined another group of 200 officers and were able for the first time to send wires to Switzerland telling they were prisoners and asking for parcels. It was two months before these began to arrive and meantime they were taken to camp midway between Dantzig and the Polish border. They were spit at by the people but did not mind that. Already there were 400 officers there. The food was very poor. They were given coffee at 8, soup at 12 and again at 6. The soup was made from mangold wurtzel and kol rabi. Occasionally they were given a few black peas or potatoes and once a week a black loaf. They all became very weak so that they did not care to go out on parole and the growing boys often fainted on parade. They could hardly climb the stairs. A school was started, a library formed and classes in French, German and shorthand occupied their attention. However, it was difficult to concentrate.

The first food that arrived was some bully beef and biscuits and it was the best food they ever tasted. It was followed by Red Cross clothing, pyjamas, soap and other things. They sent and received letters and post cards and by means of a code managed to get information from the outside and give it.

More food and clothing followed and also dripping, bully beef, tobacco and cigarettes. Later, thanks to the Red Cross of Prince Rupert they were kept well supplied. This was the first opportunity he had found of publicly thanking the local people for what they had done. Their health improved so that they were now able to go on parole. While on parole they could not escape but once their cards were returned they lost no opportunity. They dug tunnels beneath the wood pile and a number managed to get away but all were captured except one and he, Capt. Clinton, got to Roumania where he died from exposure. He had made eight attempts to escape. The punishment for attempting to escape was eight days in the cells.
