## JAPANESE TO SAVE ORDER TO REBUILD

Various Methods of Doing Without Luxuries Suggested by Chamber of Commerce

TOKIO, Dec. 12.—The Tokio Chamber of Commerce believes that Japanese generally should follow the example of self-denial of the Imperial family in foregoing all court luxuries and formalities as a mark of sympathy with the people in their stricken condition.

The chamber has suggested that the following be observed as a matter of economy:

Abandonment of all formal dress for business dress for one year.

That giving of presents be abolished to a large degree.

That marriage and funeral ceremonies be as simple as possible.

That plain food be eaten, drinks curtailed and banquets eliminated.

That number of servants be decreased and each member of a family work.

That cost of production be decreased as far as possible to place on market products at lowest prices.

## FLASK IN HIP POCKET
