## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and  
reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to  
\$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to sur-  
veyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering any  
land suitable for agricultural purposes  
and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished,  
but parties not known that for some  
arrange for adjacent pre-emption  
with joint residence, but each making  
necessary improvements on respective  
claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for  
five years and make improvements to  
value of \$10 per acre, including clear-  
ing and cultivation of at least 5 acres  
before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation of  
less than 5 acres and has made pro-  
portionate improvements, he may be  
granted a certificate of improvement  
and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent res-  
idence may be issued, provided appli-  
cant makes improvements to extent of  
\$350 per annum and records same each  
year. Failure to make improvements  
or record same will operate as for-  
feiture. Title cannot be obtained in  
less than 5 years, and improvement  
of \$100 per acre, including clearing  
and cultivation, and residence of  
at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant  
may record another pre-emption, if the  
tenures land in conjunction with his  
firm without actual occupation, pro-  
vided statutory improvements made  
and residence maintained on Crown  
granted land.

Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20  
acres may be leased as homesteads,  
title to be obtained after fulfilling res-  
idential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes  
areas exceeding 640 acres may be  
leased by one person or company.  
Mills, factories or industrial sites on  
timber land not exceeding 640 acres  
may be purchased; conditions include  
payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible  
by existing roads may be purchased  
conditional upon construction of a road  
to them. Reimbursement of one-half of cost of  
road, not exceeding half of purchase  
price, is made.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**  
The scope of this Act is enlarged to  
include all persons joining and serv-  
ing with His Majesty's forces, (the  
one within, which the heirs or devisees  
of a deceased pre-emptor may apply  
title under the Act is extended  
from one year from the death of  
such person, as formerly, until one  
year after the conclusion of the great  
war. This privilege is also made re-  
spective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are  
due or payable by holders on pre-  
emptions recorded after June 26, 1918.  
Fees are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys ac-  
crued, due and been paid since August  
1, 1914, on account of payments, fees  
or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase  
town or city lots held by members of  
veteran forces, or descendants acquired  
before or indirectly or retained from an  
ancestor to March 31, 1920.

**SUB-PURCHASES OF CROWN  
LANDS**  
Provision made for issuance of  
Crown grants to sub-purchasers of  
Crown Lands, acquiring rights from  
purchasers who failed to complete  
purchase, involving forfeiture, on ful-  
fillment of conditions of purchase, in-  
terest and taxes. Where sub-purchas-  
ers do not claim whole of original par-  
cel, purchase price due and taxes may  
be distributed proportionately to the  
whole area. Applications must be made  
by May 1, 1920.

**GRAZING**  
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic  
development of livestock industry pro-  
vides for granting districts and range  
administration, under Commissioner.  
Annual grazing permits issued based  
on numbers ranged, priority for estab-  
lished owners. Stock-owners may  
form Associations for range manage-  
ment. Free, or partially free, permits  
for settlers, campers or travellers, up  
to ten head.

ATTRACTS A CROWD**

Displayed in Moscow Shops Men,  
Women and Children Stop to  
Stare

MOSCOW, Feb. 1.—Moscow is  
rapidly assuming some of its old  
time splendor in the shopping  
district; so far as the stores are  
concerned it is becoming normal.

The most expensive French  
and German perfumes, toilet ar-  
ticles, lingerie and other luxuries,  
after an absence of many years,  
are again on sale in Moscow.

Petrograd and some of the other  
Russian cities. While the greater  
part of these goods, according to  
officials, have been smuggled in-  
to the country, nevertheless they  
are sold openly as in pre-revolution  
days, but at enormous prices.

Government officials, while aware  
of the smuggling, say they are  
powerless to break it up.

When the first fluffy, lace  
trimmed garments from abroad  
appeared in the display windows  
of the Moscow shops the incident  
nearly caused a riot. Men,  
women and children were wildly  
eager to get a peek at the things  
from the outer world. They had  
seen nothing of the kind for seven  
or eight years, and fought for a  
place in the mob for a few min-  
utes' gaze at the finery.

Most of the luxuries are three  
or four times as expensive here  
as in London and Paris. This,  
decriers say, is due to the govern-  
ment monopoly on goods from  
abroad which keeps prices so  
high that the smuggling business  
is paying handsomely to those  
engaged in it.
