Australia is Already Ridding Itself of Incubus by Selling Out

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. - (By Canadian Press .-- Control of industries by government, both Commonwealth and State, for long characteristic of business activity in Australia, is beginning to lose favor. So says F. R. Eldreege, chief of the Far Eastern Division of the U.S. Department of Commerce in a report which thas just been issued.

Operates Factories

The Australian government owns and operates a shipping line as well as a shipyard, a considrable part of the railways, and miso the production and distribution of sugar and metal. All of the States operate railroads, and in Victoria, says Mr. Eldredge, the State operates eleven separate endertakings ranging from beetsugar production to accident insurance. New South Wales similarly conducts among other things a sawmill, a bakery and a motor garage. Increased opposition to such interference with icdividual enterprise is now so marked, howover, that it is expected government control may soon be confined to public utili-

The isolation and comparative youth of Australia," remarks Mr. Eldredge, "have been great factors in inducing the governments to constitute themselves the centres for business enterprise, but this tendency is giving way with the improvement of communications and transporta-
