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TICE PLEASED WITH INTERIOR

Crops Are Very Good in Bulkley: Urges Use of Certified Seed Potatoes

SMITHERS, Aug. 27.—Crops in general are in excellent condition in the interior district according to E. Tice, potato expert and acting chief soil and crop inspector, who has been travelling with J. W. Eastham, provincial plant pathologist, and who spent a few days here on an official inspection. Mr. Tice says the oat crop is particularly fine while other grain crops could hardly be excelled. An earlier oat than would be more suited to the locality. Vegetables throughout the district are in prime condition and he knows no other part of the province that can excel this one in production. On the farm of Geo. Oulton, just out of Smithers, he said, he saw Irish cobbler potatoes which rank among the finest seen anywhere. He is convinced that the Bulkley, Francois Lake and Terrace districts are particularly well suited for the growing of seed potatoes. He advises the growing of one or two standard varieties paying particular attention to the selection of seed.

As an evidence of the superiority of certified seed, Mr. Tice mentioned H. L. Franks of Terrace who secured a quantity of certified seed last spring. The varieties were Gold Coin and Netted Gem. He now has a field of excellent potatoes which are superior in every way to those grown from ordinary stocks of the same variety.

The greatest problems in connection with farming here are transportation and marketing and if agricultural work in the interior is to be a success, these problems should have immediate attention, Mr. Tice suggests. In these days of high priced labor the farmers must do all they can to overcome the high cost of production and in no way can this better be done than by the use of pure seed.
