The Admiral of the Mosquito fleet reports a very satisfactory week along the waterfront in all departments of nautical doings, and is well satisfied with the manner in which the boys have been putting the fish business over. The halibut arrivals have been up to the expectations and prices have remained steady for both first and second class catches. While Canadian first class catches have fetched a slightly lower price than the American the second class catches of the home fleet have obtained from 1c. to 1 1/2c more, the demand of the eastern provinces being well maintained. The weather on the high spots changed somewhat early in the week and the cold winds had a detrimental effect upon the run of fish but only to a slight degree. Several of the large American schooners have rejoined the northern fleet from the south, after undergoing the regular annual overhaul, which insures increased landings in the near future. Salmon arrivals have been lighter this week which is accounted for by the fact that the canneries are now well under way and the little fellows are dealing with the fish packers.

Sunday Jollifications
Although the weather appeared somewhat threatening in the morning a number of picnic parties took a chance last Sunday and hiked out of port early in the day for various fields of exploration. A number of the larger boats of the fishing and pleasure fleet went out as far as Lucy Island, Porcher Island and Tugwell while the smaller fry crept around to local points in the harbor. Digby Island, Salt Lakes and Crippen's cannery coming in for their share of visitors.

Doc's Ideas of Keeping House

Hand Saw Fish Was Sent to Victoria
Curator Kermode Identifies Specimen Forwarded by B. J. Bacon

B. J. Bacon of the Prince Rupert Fish Market has received a letter from F. Kermode, curator of the Provincial Museum at Victoria, stating that a fish specimen recently sent him was known as the hand saw fish, *Alepisaurus borealis*. His letter says:

"This fish is known as the Hand Saw fish, *Alepisaurus borealis*, and yours is only the third specimen that I have known to be taken in British Columbia. The first specimen we had was taken at Quatsino Sound in 1895, the next was taken off Victoria in February 1897. It is a deep water fish and appears to be rare on the coast. According to Jordan & Everman's book on fishes they only have two specimens in the California academy of science which were taken years ago."

The fish in question was on exhibition in the fish shop about a month ago prior to shipment to Victoria.

The halibut schooner Wabash is on the N.M. McLean ways undergoing an annual overhaul.

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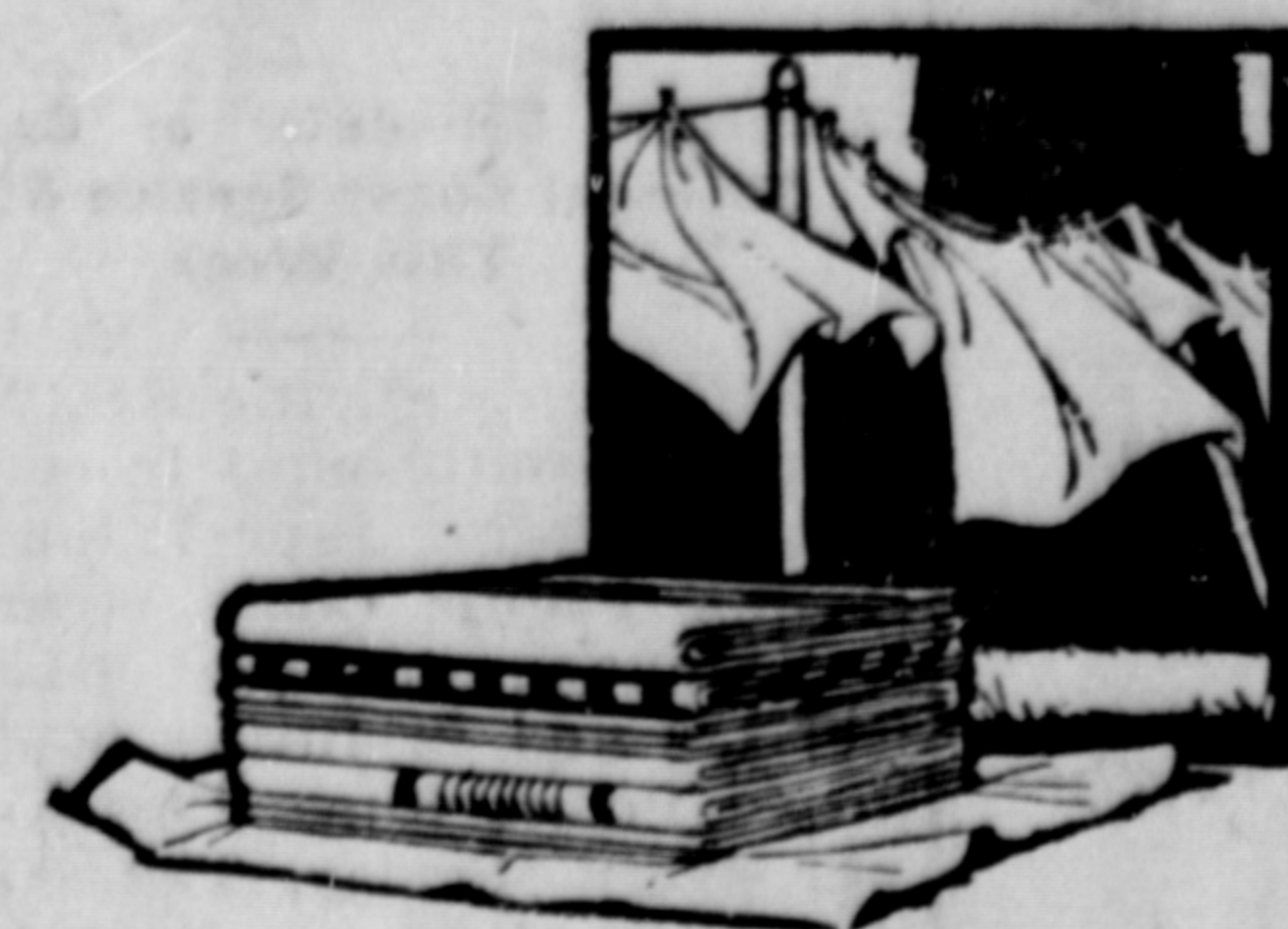
