CANADA AND SWEDEN TIE FOR TRADE WITH AUSTRALIA IN PAPER

WASHINGTON, May 17.—Canada tied with Sweden for second place in the list of countries selling paper to Australia in 1921, according to statistics recently issued by the Australian government and reported to the Department of Commerce by the U.S. Consul at Sydney. The Australian paper imports for the year ending June 30, 1921, according to this report, were: From Great Britain, \$8,672,000; Canada and Sweden, approximately \$5,100,000 each; from the United States, \$3,760,000; from Norway, \$3,260,000.

AFTERNOON TEA IS RECOMMENDED TO UNITED STATES USE

Gordon Selfridge, Chicago Merchant, Speaks Interestingly on English Rite

Gordon Selfridge, the Chicago merchant who invaded and conquered London, is revisiting the United States, and touches on some piquant contrasts between his native and adopted countries says the Toronto Globe. He has the advantage of a double standard of comparison, of seeing the British through American eyes. To an interviewer he lays amusing emphasis on an English social rite, afternoon tea, which is the subject of mild decision on the part of visitors to the Tight little island—until they succumb to it. Mr. Selfridge thinks that if Americans would similarly relax in the middle of the afternoon work they would gain a poise and calm they really need and lose none of their famous "pep." When he opened his departmental store on Oxford Street thirteen years ago it was the custom of his salespeople to snatch tea as best they could. Instead of discouraging it he accepted it as a national institution, and gave a tea interval to his 3,000 employees, and "since everybody else in the country does it, no time or business was lost." He is quoted further:

"Tea is brought around at maidens and movies, on railway trains and boats. Lords and commoners pause for it in parliament. You cannot enter any office, editorial den, public library, factory or shop in Great Britain between four or five without stumbling over cups and tea tins."

Friendly Get Together

"Mr. Selfridge confessed that, personally, he did not like tea, but he likes what it stands for—a friendly get together, a relaxing pause in the day's work, a slowing down of the American's relentless push, not to a point of becoming less active, but more balanced." The American has a breakdown at 50, he added, but the Englishman was swinging a wicked golf club at 65.

Afternoon tea has become a social function on this side of the Atlantic, but it has not seriously penetrated the market place. After all, is it not the tea hour that gives the Briton poise and calm. It is merely one expression of his unburied habits and ways of living and of looking at life. Before work slows down in offices, factories and shops on this continent in the presence of the tea-cups, there will have to be a radical change in the mental as well as the physical habits of the business community.

DIVORCES ARE FEWER THOUGH EASY TO GET UNDER RUSSIAN SOVIET

Extremely Difficult to Get Houses and Two Live in One Room

MOSCOW, May 19.—Though extremely easy to secure under Soviet laws, divorces are decreasing in Moscow because of the housing shortage. Most Muscovites have to live at least two in a room, and however incompatible a couple may find life together, even this is easier than the task of finding new and separate quarters.

Marriages, on the other hand, are promoted by the housing shortage, for a person enjoying the rare privilege of having a large room to himself or herself finds little difficulty in persuading a perhaps roomless mate to share it.

Official statistics show there were only 49 divorces in Moscow in January, as compared to 2,214 marriages. The requirements both for uniting and separating couples are brief and simple. If a man and woman desire to be married, they go before a magistrate and declare their wish. If they desire a divorce, they go before a magistrate and say they cannot get along. If only one of the parties wishes a divorce, the questioning may take a few minutes longer.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation less than 2 years, and has made pre-emptive improvements, he may be granted a certificate of pre-emption, but must occupy and improve the land for a further period of three years.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may receive another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows, inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Relate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of deceased pre-emptors may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by addressees on pre-emption recorded after June 26, 1918.

Taxes are required for five years. Provision for return of money accrued, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on addressees.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces or their dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area; applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
