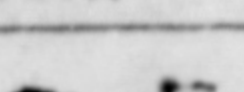

ALASKA SHIPS VALUABLE FUR

Total Catch of Year is Estimated
at \$1,800,000; Muskrat
Leads

According to figures compiled by the bureau of biological survey, furs shipped from Alaska to the states, exclusive of seal skins, for the year between December, 1921, and November 30, 1922, were valued at \$1,800,000. In the same period seal skins shipped were valued at approximately \$1,000,000.

Pelts of muskrats are the largest single items in the list of skins shipped, having a value of \$191,431.25. This, however, did not equal the combined value of all kinds of foxes, listed separately, which is shown as being \$193,306.50.

Many Shipments

The shipments aggregated 395,247 individual skins of all kinds, of which virtually 90 per cent, or 343,145, were muskrats. Marten skins shipped during the same period numbered 10,385, valued at \$285,587.50; beaver, 12,216 skins with a total valuation of \$250,428; mink 31,983 skins, valued at \$223,881.

The bureau's statistics show that blue fox pelts shipped by private individuals, firms or corporations had an average valuation of \$16.82 higher than the pelts shipped from the government's farm on the Pribilof Islands. In the former class of shipments there were 1,080 skins, averaging \$110 each, aggregating in value \$118,000; the government shipped from the Pribilofs, 712 blue foxes, averaging \$93.18 each, totalling \$66,344, the grand total for blue fox pelts being \$185,444. Government white fox skins exceeded in value those shipped by private individuals or firms, the former getting \$46 and the latter \$40 per pelt.

OTTAWA RIVER IS
VERY DEEP STREAM

Lecturer Says Its Depth is One
Mile in Places—One of
Greatest River Canyons

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 6.—(Canadian Press).—That the Ottawa River is a mile deep in some places was the interesting statement made here recently by Rev. George Bosfield, a member of the Ottawa Arts and Letters Club, lecturing before the Carnegie Library students. Taking as his theme "The Mysteries and Beauties of the Deep River Section of the Upper Ottawa," the lecturer described the many scenic and geographical features of this portion of the river, and he stressed the fact that many Canadians were too often prone to travel far afield in search of the beauties of nature, when matchless charms lay in their own scenery close at hand.

Rev. Mr. Bosfield pointed out that the mysteries of this section of the Ottawa River lay in its remarkable depth, at certain points it being found that in places it is a mile deep, and that it was therefore one of the greatest river canyons in the continent.

PRINCE RUPERT ASSESSMENT DISTRICT.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a Court of Revision and Appeal under the provisions of the "Taxation Act" and Amendments thereof and "Public Schools Act" respecting the assessment roll for the Prince Rupert Assessment District for the year 1922, will be held at the Provincial Assessor's Office in the Court House Building, Prince Rupert, B.C., on Wednesday, the 21st day of February, 1923, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and second-class land reduced to \$5 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least a "tree" before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation more than 2 years, and has made improvements, he may be granted a temporary certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$50 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained if less than 5 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may recede another pre-emption, if he recedes land in conjunction with his former actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 60 acres may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased, provided conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible to existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by holders on pre-emption recorded after January 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of money advanced, due and paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, less taxes on holders' pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
