NEW BOOKS FOR ANYOX LIBRARY

High School Students Help to Catalogue and Prepare Them for Circulation

ANYOX, Mar. 21.—At the last regular meeting of the Anyox Parent Teachers' Association, held in the new school, the business session included an encouraging report from the convener of the school library committee, who stated that about half of the books ordered recently had arrived and were already in good circulation. The High School students did excellent work in preparing these books for circulation, and acquired some valuable training in library cataloguing. In the discussion which followed this report, it was pointed out that a perusal of the new titles on the school library shelves might produce more interest on the part of the parents in what the committee was endeavoring to do, the object being to encourage the boys and girls to read only good, wholesome and sensible books.

Before the business of the evening was completed, one hundred dollars was voted to be used in procuring pictures for the walls of the class rooms, and to purchase several teachers' reference books. To aid the committee already appointed the number was increased to six, the additional members being Mrs. Ed. Conway and Miss Bowes.

On the completion of the evening's business H. R. King, who had anticipated giving a resume of early B.C. history, read instead an enlightening article entitled "Well, I didn't know that," written by Edward Bok, for a great many years identified with the "Ladies Home Journal." To the majority of those present, this article proved a great source of information and insight into the customs and institutions of that very remarkable country, the Netherlands. This astute and energetic nation, as was pointed out, has given to the world, and certainly without due credit, many of the men and ideas which have made itself and other nations, particularly the United States of America, great.

Not only because of the enjoyableness of his instructive paper, but for the reason also that he is to leave Anyox shortly, Mr. King was accorded a hearty vote of thanks in appreciation of his active interest in the school work of this community as president of the School Board. During the social hour, Miss Zeigler and Max Morrow contributed very pleasing instrumental and vocal selections, Miss B. A. Leitch accompanying the latter. Refreshments and the singing of the National Anthem brought a very successful meeting to a close.
