150 SCHOOLS ARE CLOSED IN MANITOBA

Resolution Introduced to Shut Down on Higher Education Until Lower Schools Open

WINNIPEG, Mar. 20.--In view of the number of rural schools in the province closed through the lack of finances, Joseph Hamelin, member for St. Rose, has given notice of a resolution which, if endorsed by the legislature, will mean that the government must discontinue all expenditures for secondary and university education until the needs of the elementary schools are satisfied.

The opening clauses of the resolution point out that education is of the highest importance; that 150 schools are closed at the present time; and that it was the first duty of the government to see that all children obtained an education to grade 8. The resolution concludes: "That in the opinion of this house the government should regard elementary education as of greater importance than secondary or university education, and should curtail or discontinue financial aid for secondary and university education until adequate funds are provided for the operation of every elementary school in Manitoba."

PRAIRIE NEWSPAPER FAVOR OF MOUNTIES

Editorial in Edmonton Bulletin Says Bolsheviki System Not Wanted

J. S. Woodsworth, M.P., failed in his attempt to get Parliament to chase the Mounted Police out of the prairie provinces says the Edmonton Bulletin. It is to the credit of the Winnipeg member that he made no pretense about the reason why he wanted the force restricted to the regulations of trappers and Indians in unorganized territories. The Mounties he said, quite truthfully, are obnoxious to the particular brand of "labor" which he represents. But that, of course, is also the reason why people who are not "red" require and want the protection of some such body against the plans of Mr. Woodsworth and his associates to set up a bolshevik system of government on the prairies. As the non-reds happen to be more numerous than the reds, the Police are to remain and the dawn of the Soviet era is postponed.
