Dr. Cook the Explorer Goes to Penitentiary for Fraud in Connection with Oil Promotion

FORT WORTH, Texas, Nov. 22 .- Dr. Fred A. Cook, Arctic explorer, , was yesterday convicted on twelve counts of using the mails to defraud in connection with oil stock promotions and was sentenced to fourteen years and nine months in the penitentiary. He was also fined \$12,000.

Cook's partner, A. K. Eckman, was sentenced to seven years in the same institution and fined \$12,000.
