GIANT IRRIGATION SCHEME IN ALBERTA

Two Large Districts Will Have 130,000 Acres Under Water This Year

LETHBRIDGE, Alta., Feb. 7.—The year 1923 will see two large irrigation undertakings in Southern Alberta brought to a stage where the land will be "under the ditch," with water being delivered to the farmers' land.

The larger of these projects is the Lethbridge Northern Irrigation district, comprising some 220,000 acres of land, of which 105,000 acres are irrigable. In general terms this project lies between the Old Man and Little Bow rivers, west and north of Lethbridge, and extending as far west as the pioneer town of Macleod. The smaller is known as the United Irrigation district, and lies in the foothill country west of Cardston and about 25 miles south of Macleod. This project is of 25,000 irrigable acres. The two projects will bring 130,000 acres of land under the ditch, or the equivalent of almost six townships.

Both projects were built during the past two years under the Alberta Irrigation District Act, and the financing was made possible by the guarantee of the districts' six per cent bonds by the provincial government. The bonds are 30 year bonds, interest only being paid the first ten years, and thereafter equal annual instalments of principal are added.

The cost of the Lethbridge Northern will be just over \$10 per acre, while the United will get off with about \$25. The districts are, however, arranging to carry the interest charges until the end of 1924 as a capital charge, so that the Lethbridge Northern in the end will find the irrigation venture capitalized at \$50 per acre while the United will cost about \$30.

MOVE TOWN TO GET IRON ORE FROM MINE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The town of Hibbing, Minn., with a population of more than 15,000, will be moved to enable the Oliver Iron Mining Company to mine the iron ore which underlies it, as a result of the recent action of the supreme court in dismissing for want of jurisdiction the appeal of Henry P. Reed and others.

The mining company owns most of the land on which the town is located and when it was proposed that the people of Hibbing should move, Reed and 72 other residents made an unsuccessful court fight against the proposal.

BOW LEGS BECOMING THING OF THE PAST

Better Nutrition Results in Great Improvement Doctor Says

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—"Legs are getting straighter," Dr. Asa B. Davis of the Lying-in Hospital, where 1,000 babies are examined weekly, said today. "Bow legs are passing," Dr. Davis said, "and legs of this type are fast giving way to legs like I. Moreover, legs fashioned x and legs modelled are fewer than they were."

"Parents no longer teach their children to walk too soon," Dr. Davis stated as the reason for the change. "Bowleggedness is really caused by malnutrition; a simple deficiency in bone-making calcium. Vitamins, in good milk, fruit juices, grains and vegetables are rapidly eliminating rickets in neighborhoods where health information is easily available."

AUSTRALIAN WOOL IS SHIPPED TO ENGLAND

MELBOURNE, Feb. 7.—The last of the wool purchased by the British government during the four seasons 1916 to 1920 inclusive has been shipped to the Old Country. Owing to the state of the wool market during the greater part of 1921, shipments of the remaining stocks had been postponed. When loadings were resumed toward the end of 1921, there remained in store 314,993 bales, all of which have now been shipped to England.
