EDMONTON OUT FOR INDUSTRIES

Board of Trade Would Grant Concessions to Those Establishing in City

EDMONTON, Feb. 6. — Encouragement of new industries to the city by granting concessions and the appointment of an industrial commissioner as recommended by the industrial committee of council was given the entire approval of the Board of Trade through a special committee of that organization appointed to investigate the matter with the committee of council. At a meeting of the two committees Thursday afternoon arrangements were made for immediately starting a publicity campaign which for the present will be handled by the Board of Trade, and later to be taken over by the industrial commissioner when he is appointed.

Special Concessions

The recommendations of Ald. A. U. G. Bury, chairman of the industrial committee to grant special concessions to any industries that could be induced to locate in the city was favored by the meeting. The concessions which will be offered are to be sites at low prices, leases of land at reasonable terms and utilities, the exact nature of which will have to be determined by the council.

It was made quite clear by the meeting that no inducement would be offered industries who would furnish unfair competition for industries already established in the city. An effort will be made as far as possible to secure new industries.

The industrial commissioner who will be appointed will be attached to the city land department. The meeting also suggested that the offices of the

MUSIC INCITED RIOT IN INDIA

Hindus and Moslems Strive in City of Bangalore Over Religious Rights

BANGALORE, India, Feb. 7.—Friction between Hindu and Moslem communities has resulted in serious disturbances in Tiptur, in Mysore province, during recent weeks. Numerous assaults have been reported, and on several occasions the shops have had to close their doors. Special police forces have been called out, and now have the situation well under control.

The cause of these disturbances lies in part in the differing attitudes of Hindus and Mohammedans regarding music. Hindu religious ceremonies are usually accompanied by music. Mohammedans have no music at their services, and are seriously disturbed when interrupted by musical sounds.

In 1882, the government permitted the reconstruction of a mosque within the Hindu quarters, with the distinct understanding that the Mohammedans should on no account object to processions with music passing in front thereof. The Mohammedans now contend that since music was never played before this mosque from 1882 to almost the present time, permission should always be disallowed for processions with music in that place. The Hindus, on the other hand, have been asking since 1920 for permission to take an image in procession in the streets, absolutely without restrictions. The government, after a protracted inquiry, decided to admit the Hindu claim.

Crowds Incited

The present trouble began at the Dussarah procession last September. On this occasion the government refused to grant a license, on account of the excited feelings of both communities and the influx of irresponsible crowds in the city. In the following month, however, a procession was allowed. Before the procession occurred, the Mohammedans left the mosque in a body as a protest, and the procession passed quietly.

This incident led to high feelings between the two communities. Many individual assaults occurred, and general apprehensions of a breach of the peace were prevalent. On account of threatened violence, the Hindu shops were closed for two days. The district magistrate was called and, with a large police force, reached the place in time to prevent further disorder. Reinforcements are now present, and are keeping careful watch over the district.

WAR ON GAMBLING IN FAIRS OF MANITOBA

No Illegal Methods of Raising Revenue to be Allowed in Province

WINNIPEG, Feb. 7.—War has been declared against gambling devices, games of chance and counter attractions, other than of an educational nature, at Manitoba educational fairs. The prevalence of these devices and attractions at the 1922 summer fairs was criticized severely this morning at the annual convention of Manitoba Agricultural societies and intimations were given that unless they are eliminated from the 1923 fairs government grants will be withheld.

S. T. Newton, superintendent of agricultural societies for the province, referred to the subject in his annual report. He said:

"Owing to the increased number of exhibits available funds have been taxed to the limit, with the result that the directors have been forced to seek other means of revenue, and this has proved to be the opportunity of the concessionaires to operate gambling devices under the disguise of skill and science, where those who play them have not a chance to win.

Games Doubled

"There were double as many games of 'chance and skill' in Manitoba during 1922 as in the previous years, although you have no legal right, and God knows you have no moral right to permit temptation to be put in the way of boys and girls at your fairs that you would not tolerate for a minute if one of your storekeepers attempted to dispose of his goods in that way.
