ANYOX IS PREPARING FOR CHRISTMAS AND OTHER FESTIVITIES

Proposal For Skating Ring Proves Too Expensive; Tobogganing Planned

ANYOX, Nov. 9.—At the meeting of the Community League council this week it was decided to make a number of changes in plans for the Christmas festivities. The secretary's report had to do with the progress made in connection with the big sports concert and banquet billed for Wednesday, November 14, when the Community League would be hosts at a gathering of some hundred and fifty sportsmen.

A figure for altering the lower tennis court into a skating rink for the coming winter was presented. The cost had been figured by J. Smith and would amount to approximately \$1,200. This did not cover the cost of putting the court in shape for tennis in the spring.

Children's Dance

The matter of the Xmas dance for grown-ups and the entertainment for children was again brought up. Mrs. Dwyer, chairman of the committee, had suggested at an interim meeting that the original plan for the children's day should be altered, that a separate day should be set aside and that the younger children should be entertained during the afternoon and the older ones in the evening, the afternoon to be devoted to games, and the evening to games and dancing, and to be a costume affair, the league to offer prizes. This new arrangement made it necessary to alter the date for the grown-ups dance from December 21 to December 17. The pictures arranged for the children's party under the original scheme had been cancelled, but it was not too late to rectify this if the council didn't see its way clear to endorse the new suggestions. It might not be advisable for the Community League, owing to the general reduction in wages, to sponsor anything of a competitive nature, whereby parents, who like to see their children the equal of others in every respect, would have to provide money for costumes in order that they might be able to attend the affair. The Secretary recommended that this phase be carefully considered before any decision was made.

The council agreed to change the date for the annual Xmas dance to December 17 and that the children's day should be a separate one, the date being December 28. The nature of the entertainment caused some discussion, and it was finally agreed that the league would not foster any competition by offering prizes for costumes, that the affair in the evening would not be a fancy costume affair, but that the children could attend in any way their parents desired.

Sport Chat

For the fourth successive time Miss Joyce Wethered has succeeded in winning the English Ladies' Close Golf Championship, and the pre-eminence of Miss Wethered among lady golfers was never more apparent than in the 36 holes final for the championship, played at Ganton last month.

It was just three years ago that the young girl who was destined to become the most famous lady player of all time defeated Miss Cecil Leitch in the ladies' close championship. This was at Sheringham. When, on an epoch-making day Miss Wethered defeated the hitherto invincible champion and in doing so paved the way to her own unprecedented success. Since that time Miss Wethered has always been the British native champion, although Miss Leitch has avenged herself in the open championships.

GREAT INCREASES IN TIMBER EXPORT

VICTORIA, Nov. 10.—In a statement issued by Mr. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, the overseas shipments of timber from British Columbia for the first six months of 1923 total 220,824,894 board feet, as against 142,628,779 for the corresponding period in 1922. It will be seen that these figures represent an increase of 78,196,115 board feet, or 54%.

It is to be noted that the greatest increase in the foregoing is represented by shipments to the Atlantic seaboard, via the Panama Canal, namely, 90 millions this year as against 15 millions last year. In this connection Australia has taken 43 millions as against 25 1/2 millions, and California 28 millions as against 16 millions. These represent the most important increases in the turnover.
