



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ADVANTAGE OF PRINCE RUPERT

Trade Map of World Issued by Department of Interior Shows Distances to World Ports

An interesting map of the world issued by the Department of the Interior shows trade routes and shortest sailing distances between Canadian and foreign ports. Prince Rupert is prominently indicated and an abridged table of important sailing distances shows this port to be nearly 500 miles closer than Vancouver to Oriental ports and nearly 200 miles closer to Australian ports.

this province. But they have been regarded as Chinese. This fact cropped up in a legal suit this week when an Asiatic client visited the office of a well known barrister and K.C. The lawyer had to send out for an interpreter and a Chinese duly reported. But he could get no results. A Japanese interpreter was next called in, but he, too, could learn nothing beyond the fact that the client was not of his clan. Finally, papers were produced to show that the man was a Korean, a logging camp cook. Just how he got his job or how long he had been in the country was a mystery. It now develops that a number of Asiatics, understood to be Chinese and Japanese, are Koreans or else Siamese. It is also found there are some Filipinos in the province. The status of the latter, however, presents no great difficulty as they are wards of Uncle Sam and may be easily shifted across the border if any angle of exclusion included the islanders.

JOHN HAD DIRTY TRIP THIS WEEK

Vessel Arrived From Vancouver and Islands This Morning With 70 Passengers

After a dirty passage up the coast, the C.N.R. steamer Prince John, Capt. Harry Nelden, arrived this morning at 4 o'clock from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands. Fog and stormy weather caused delays and the vessel was held up for several hours off Massett on Monday night. She had a full list of passengers from Vancouver for island points and 70 persons arrived here from the islands, the most of them being loggers from various camps. The John returns to Vancouver via the Queen Charlottes at 8 this evening.

JAPANESE FISHERMEN IN SIBERIAN WATERS

TOKIO, July 11.—The interest taken by the business community of Japan in the fisheries negotiations with Russia will be understood when it is realized that the value of the products of Japanese fishermen in Russian waters is 30,000,000 yen annually.

There are more than 1,000 sailing and steam trawlers engaged in the industry, and about 18,000 small boats. Japanese men and women engaged number 20,000. There are six fishing grounds, one on the coast of the Maritime Province, where salmon, trout, herring and crabs are taken, and five on the coast of Kamtschatka, where the catches are similar, but runs occur later in the season.

FINED FOR FAILURE TO REPORT FOREST FIRE NEAR SMITHERS

SMITHERS, July 11. — At Smithers today before Stipendiary Magistrate Hoskins, Allen Ruthertford pleaded guilty to a contravention of the Forest Act in failing to report a forest fire. He was fined \$25 and costs.

ORIENTAL QUESTION IS DISCUSSED BY MANSON ADDRESS TO LABOR MEN

Stork said, had been instrumental in getting important legislation. Oriental licenses had been reduced 40 per cent as a result and, what more important, notice was thus served on the Oriental that his sun was beginning to set in British Columbia. New things were always being found to correct and next session it would be possible to do more along these lines.

Mr. Stork referred to the establishment of the Board of Conciliation on the civic wage dispute and expressed the opinion that the minister of labor had acted rightly in having the board established on the mayor's request regardless of other opposition.

Halibut Close Season

J. H. Meagher asked Mr. Stork if the halibut close season would be effective this year. Mr. Stork replied that as far as he knew it would be on November 1 this year.

Paddy Sullivan and George Casey congratulated Mr. Stork on his activities especially as regarded the control of the Orientals in the salmon fishing industry. "It looks like real business and common sense endeavor without political trickery," declared Mr. Casey.

Mr. Stork explained that the operation of the clause allowing gas boats in District No. 2 had been delayed until next year so that local fishermen could be given the opportunity of preparing for it.

George Waddell asked if some provision could not be made towards having boats registered in this district before granting the gas boat licenses. Mr. Stork said that he would be willing to take this as well as other suggestions up if the council would place them before him in a concrete manner. He was always willing to meet the council.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 feet before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation, no less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may be cause of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$360 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or records a waste of operation as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvement of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record years, and if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mills, factories or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rate of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 25, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price does not have to be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1923.

GRAZING

Grazing Act, 1913, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settling campers or travellers, up to ten head.
