Resent Action
Of Vancouver.

The feeling against Vancouver is very hostile just now owing to the attitude of a section of the people there in trying to get the drydock removed and in its general attitude toward Prince Rupert's representative on the board of directors of the railway. At the meeting of the board of trade yesterday a boycott was openly advocated and urged with some force and throughout the city there have been expressions of opinion that a boycott against Vancouver should at once be instituted.

If it is found that Vancouver took official action to secure the removal of the drydock, this paper will do all it can to back up a boycott of Vancouver. As it is, the merchants of Vancouver do practically all the business that is to be done here. They have been waxing fat at our expense and now it looks as if they would stab us in the back. This is naturally resented by the whole city. It certainly is not good business for the Vancouver board of trade or any other public body there to take the attitude that everything should be centred in their city. They must realize that other places have to live.

The opinion is freely expressed that while the Prince Rupert people are law abiding and generally have been a peaceful people they will not permit a tug to come here and tow that dock away. Because Vancouver happens to be a big place is no justification for such action. If the people here get so worked up over the matter, they can hardly be blamed. They have had to struggle hard against adverse circumstances. Agreements and promises have been ruthlessly broken by the railway company and by politicians and the people here have come to lose faith in everybody and everything. As a last hope they elected a supporter of the government to represent them at Ottawa. They feel that if they now can get no consideration they will have to take the matter in their own hands and let the outside world know that they believe in the old British maxim: "What we have we'll hold."

Influence Of
A Strong Man.

The influence of a strong man was seen in Nova Scotia where for 27 years Hon. George Murray was head of the government. So seldom does one party remain in power for many years that this particular case is very noteworthy. Perhaps it is even more noteworthy because Nova Scotia is a small province with all the prejudices that go with a small community. Small places are more liable to change than larger ones. Yet Mr. Murray kept his hold on the people and still retains it today. Twice he refused honors from the King, preferring to remain a common citizen rather than be set apart with a title. By his works he is known rather than by his title.

So it is everywhere. In every community there are strong men who become leaders. They are selected naturally as the men to represent the people. Happy is the place that has men of integrity and honor and ability to fill such positions.

Keep Faith In
Our City.

An interview with Mr. Bell on this page shows that some people still have faith in this city. There is still a future for us. Let us hold on to that idea. We have had reverses and we have had dull times. There is, however, a silver lining to the cloud. We fancy we can see things coming our way. This port will yet be an important one. There is no reason to feel anything but optimistic but there is reason to keep our faith in ourselves and let the outside know that though we are small we are not to be imposed upon.

TIMBERMAN IS
OPTIMISTIC

One of Owners of Local Mill Says
Hopes Make Arrangements
Leading to Opening up

LUMBER BUSINESS GOOD

People Are Looking to Northern
Pacific Coast For Their
Future Supply

J. A. W. Bell, one of the executives of the Emberson Estate, who is in the city in connection with taking over the management of the local mill from E. F. Doby who is going into the brokerage business here, says he is very optimistic as to the future of Prince Rupert. He says he is hopeful of making arrangements in the near future that will lead to the reopening of the mill here. The holding company which he represents has fifty square miles of fine timber on the coast which has been well reseeded and shown to have six hundred million feet of merchantable product. This with the mill at Prince Rupert makes an ideal property.

Activity Assured

Mr. Bell says he has always had faith in the future of this city. The steady growing scarcity of timber makes it necessary for the lumbermen to look to the Pacific coast for their supply and especially to the north coast where the timber is easy of access. At present there is a steady and growing demand for timber and this is bound to result in activity around Prince Rupert. The fact that it is cheaper to haul lumber to the east coast by the Panama Canal than by rail direct makes the demand consistent all the time. There is now a market for every grade and the business is stabilized.

Encourage Industry

The need of the encouragement of basic industries at Prince Rupert is one of the things Mr. Bell stresses. Get one basic industry going and other naturally follow. The establishment of a pulp mill, he says, would result in great activity here, even though it employed only perhaps three hundred men. It would stimulate business in all lines. Encourage industry, and population follows as a matter of course.

In the Letter Box

CIVIC EMPLOYEES

Editor Daily News.

Kindly permit me space to briefly discuss the principle involved in the question raised by Ald. Macdonald and Ald. MacKenzie in the council meeting on January 22. The resolution is hereby reproduced and speaks for itself. "That the city council notify the Civic Employees' Union, that in 30 days from date the council intends revising the hours governing the City Hall staff from 7 to 8 hours per day, without increasing pay and if the City employees wish to be heard in opposition to the scheme that a committee from the Civic Employees' Union will be received by the Finance committee with a view to amicably adjusting the matter if possible."

To me the spirit of the resolution sounds good. It sounds like a get-together co-operative proposition; the fulfilment of the thing we have heard spoken of so often. Employer and employee coming together in a round table conference to discuss what some people term their mutual interest. But the proposal seemed to wound the dignity of some of the Aldermen.

I wish to be fair and assume that the council thought that as eight hours constituted a day's labor time, anything short of that was not giving value for money received. That being the case, in the opinion of the Aldermen there was nothing but a real sided question, nothing to arbitrate, nothing to discuss. Hence a flat repudiation.

Overtime Question

Concluding as I have that the present council intends carrying out the late council's program, including the order that any overtime worked by the City Hall staff shall be paid for on ordinary time rates, this order coupled with the recent eight hour ultimatum, in my opinion is an imposition and provides the basis of a dispute. But it seems strange that a common sense body of business men would show contempt to a proposal providing for a friendly table conference.
