VICTORIA, Sept. 14.—Appearing before the board of grain *********** commissioners here this morning. Premier Oliver referred to the unjust discrimination in freight rates against the west including the manufacturers of British Columbia and the producers of Alberta. These existing rates, he said, were throttling development in the west.

It was a question of economics which could be solved by the equalization of rates. That would mean fair competition between the east and the west. Equalization was inevitable, he said, in urging the commission that it was only just for the commissioners to recommend the removal of the alleged discriminations.
