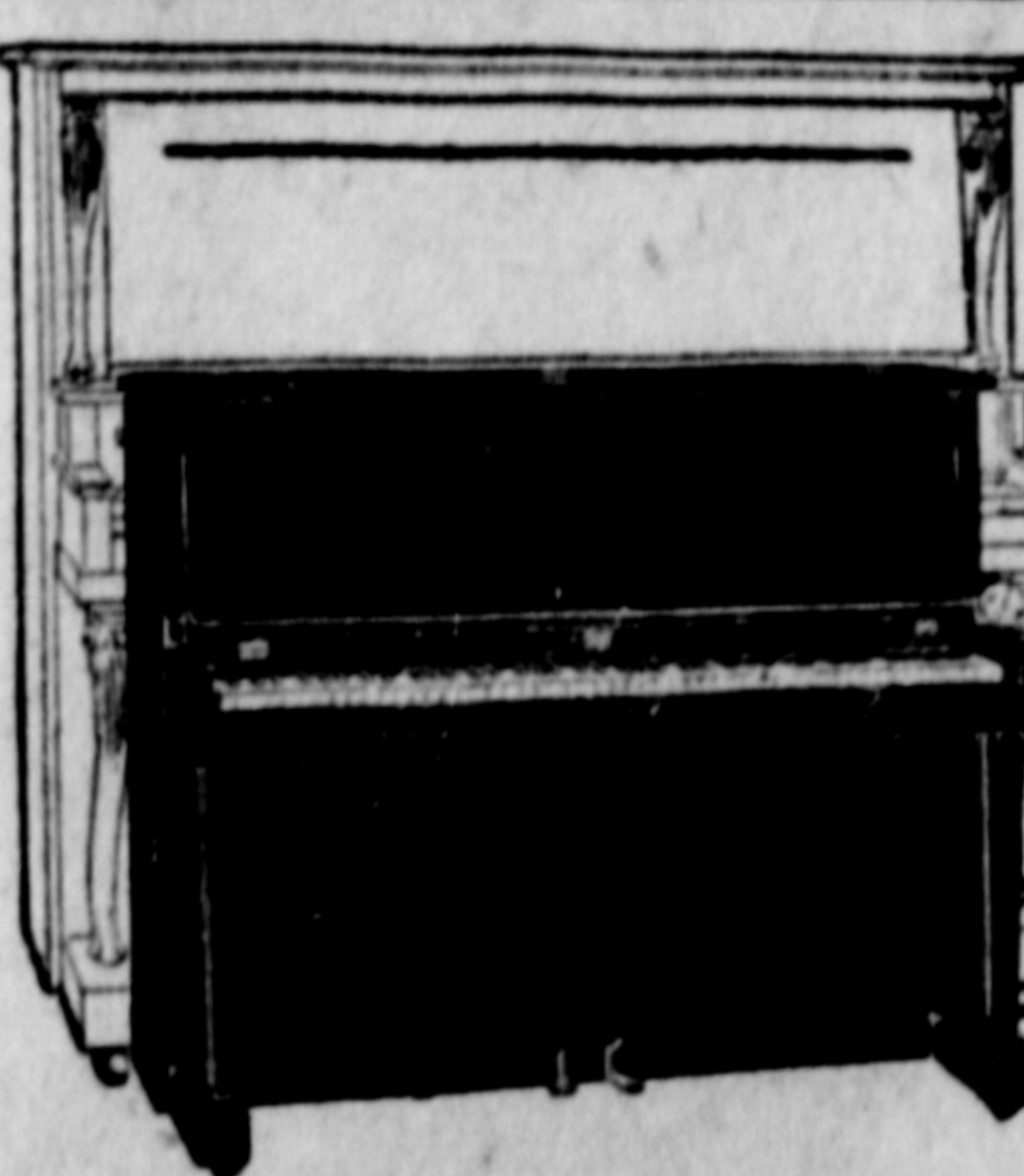

ONE OF ENEMIES OF PRINCE RUPERT

Vancouver Sun Again Objects to Money Being Spent in This City

The following is an editorial article from the Vancouver Sun under the heading "Tourist Hotels vs. Branch Lines":

"Unofficial reports from Prince Rupert indicate that the C.N.R. contemplates building a tourist hotel in that city to be ready in time for the 1924 traffic.

"Those who wish the C.N.R. well will hope the report is not true. It is not that tourist hotels are unnecessary nor even luxuries. Nor can Prince Rupert be blamed for desiring such a business brinker.

"But the real point of the situation is that hotel building is not the primary business of a railway, particularly of a railway that has yet to pay its own way.

"The first business of the C. N. R. is to serve this country with transport at the cheapest possible rate and to get the country's produce to tide water by the most economical routes.
