WINNIPEG V.C. FOR SENTENCE

Convicted of Shopbreaking and Theft and Resisting Arrest

WINNIPEG, Jan. 22.—Tomorrow sentence will be delivered on Frederick G. Coppins, V.C., by Magistrate Hugh John Macdonald, who was convicted in the police court of shopbreaking and theft and unlawfully carrying a gun. His accomplice was George Robson alias Smith.

Coppins was injured when doing special police duty in the big strike in 1919. Prior to that he was decorated with the highest British award for valor as the result of conduct in action in France with the Canadian forces. When arrested he defied the detectives and attempted to pull a revolver.

The pair were arrested when Detective Dickie with Sergt. Hoskins and Detective James Melville, on patrol at 3 a.m. observed them carrying a large parcel on Donald Street and became suspicious of their actions. Coppins and Robson fled when they saw the officers, after throwing the parcel over a nearby fence. It was recovered and the two were overhauled at the corner of Hargrave and York Streets. The package contained cigarettes and other goods valued at \$50, stolen from the store of John Allen, 549 Broadway.

Coppins refused to put his hands up and tried to break away from Dickie after the latter had prevented his attempt to reach for his hip pocket. Grabbing the gun from his pocket after the detective had fired in the air to warn him, Coppins dropped his own weapon to the street. He denied all knowledge of the weapon in court, although his accomplice swore to seeing a similar gun in his room.

BIG MISSOURI AND UNICORN MINES ARE TO BE OPENED UP

Second Payment Made on Bond by Trites and Associates

Second payment has been made on the bond put up last year by Mr. A. B. Trites of Seattle, vice-president of the famous Premier mine, and his associates to secure control of the Big Missouri and Unicorn groups of gold-silver mining properties in the Salmon River area near Stewart, according to Mr. Trites, who is in Vancouver, says the Vancouver Province.

This means that considerable development work will be undertaken on these two properties during the coming summer, he states. Last year a force of about thirty-five men was employed at the Big Missouri and it is probable that in carrying out the program for this summer that an even larger number will be out to work.

The first payment was made when the properties were bonded and active prospecting work undertaken. So satisfactory were the results of this preliminary work that Mr. Trites and his associates have felt justified in making a second payment and laying out plans for further development.
