

# OF PUPILS

Offer is Made to School Board By Dr. R. G. Large

Dr. R. Geddes Large, who had been approached by a committee of the board with a view to having, him take on the work, made an offer to the school board last night to carry out a complete medical examination of all school pupils for 50c per pupil, the doctor to supply such nursing assistance as was necessary in carrying out the examinations.

In view of the financial conditions and the fact that the city was unable to pay the salaries of the teachers anyway. Trustee Fulton felt disposed to let the medical examination of pupils go this year. Generally speaking, he believed the present plan of medical examinations to be more or less futile anyway. Simply because physical defects were pointed out was no guarantee that they would be corrected. It might be better on this occasion; to use the money that would be so expended in providing food for those in distress.

Trustee J. J. Gillis thought that the medical examination of punils was more than ever necessary this year owing to illness being general; and so many not having proper

Trustee D. C. Schubert was also doubtful as to the officacy of the present system of medical examination of school pupils.

Chairman W. J. Greer pointed out that the board did not have the money and would not be able to pay the doctor anyway.

After some further discussion, it was decided to refer the matter to next year's board.






