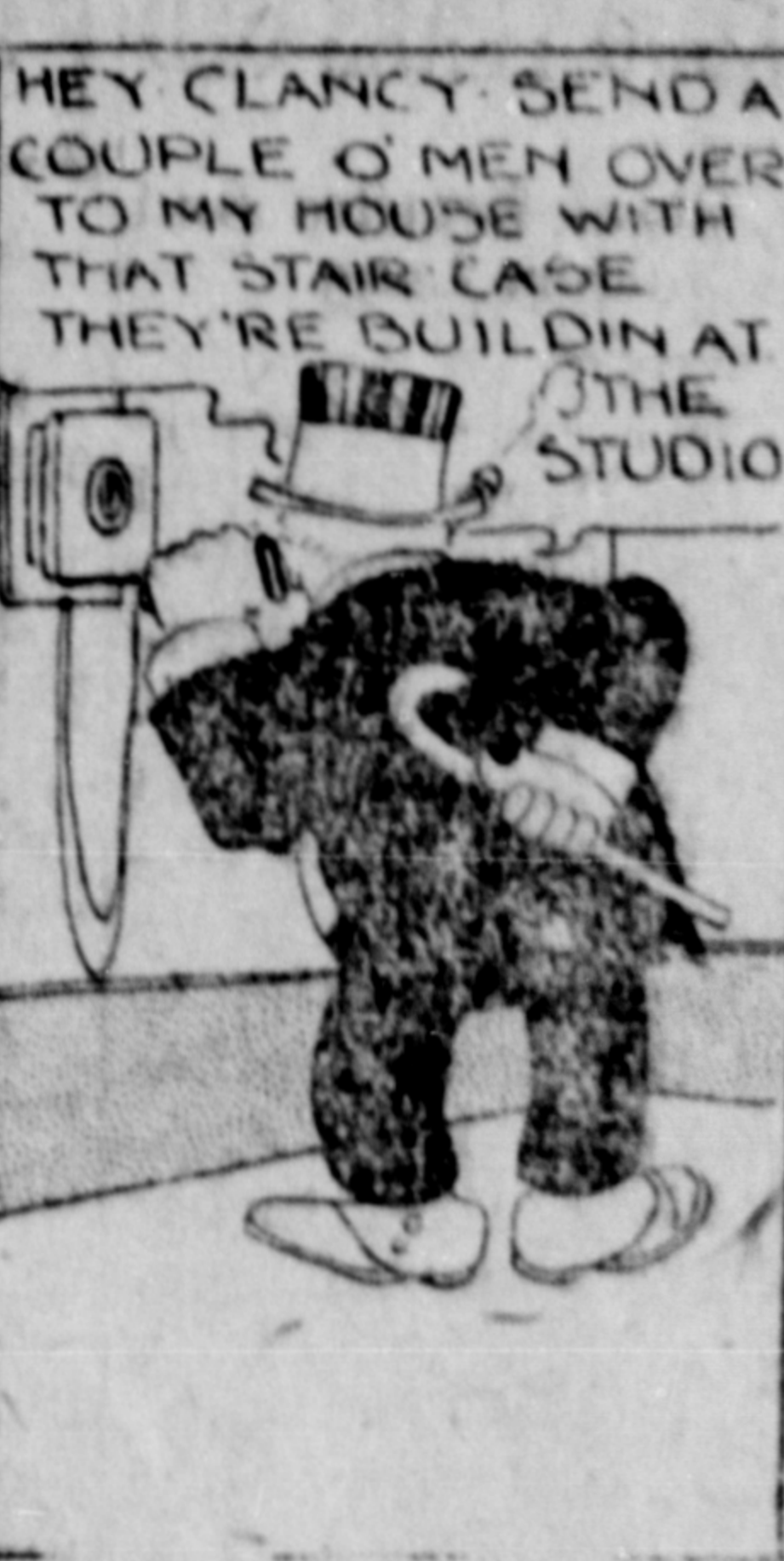

LONDON TIMES SCEPTICAL OF IMMIGRATION

Should Try to Get Britishers Before Going to Other Countries It Suggests

The statement of Mr. Robb, the new minister for immigration in the Canadian government, that his government proposes to co-operate with the British government under the provisions of the Empire Settlement Act will go some way towards dispelling the doubts which have been reluctantly expressed in this country concerning the attitude of the Dominion, says the London Times. Even if every allowance be made for the depression from which Canada has suffered in common with other countries, it is impossible to view as anything but disappointing the fact that only 167 British settlers have crossed the Atlantic to Canada under the provisions of the Act. This total, it must be remembered, includes 130 boys who left this country under the Ontario government scheme.

Welcomes Statement

Admirable as the enterprise of the provincial governments may be, the scheme cannot make headway unless it follows the broad path of Dominion co-operation, and Mr. Robb's announcement at Ottawa justifies the hope that the coming year will tell a more heartening story. "The immigration of British settlers holds first place in the program," he says, and we believe that his statement will be welcomed, not only in this country, but in Canada as well. Even in the West, where the prophets of autonomy have preached so vigorously that a Canadian should be a citizen of Canada first and a British subject afterwards, it is candidly conceded that the British settler makes the best citizen. It is true that Mr. Robb adds the qualifying statement that, inasmuch as the British Isles are unable to supply a sufficient quota of the settlers required, efforts will also be made to encourage immigration from certain areas in Europe and from the United States. It is to be hoped that the Canadian government will satisfy itself of this inability on the part of the British Isles before it goes farther afield. Even since the war, immigrants from Central Europe have swarmed into the Dominion and found for themselves new homes in the West. They are admirable spade workers. Their needs are primitive, their demands few. For this very reason, however, they show little ambition to better themselves, and they tend to remain in jealous and exclusive communities.

Reasonable Energy

Mr. Robb says that the first need of the Dominion is quality rather than quantity. Provided that there is a reasonable display of energy on the part of the Canadian authorities, both in their own country and in London, there seems to be no valid reason why both quality and quantity should not be obtainable among the people of these islands. The Canadian government intends to use the machinery of its Soldier Settlement Board. The board has been singularly successful in its efforts to settle Canadian ex-service men on the land, and the experience it has gained should be of the greatest value. The settlement of British soldiers in Canada, which is urged by Mr. Wade, has its historic precedents; there

were Wolfe's Highlanders in Nova Scotia, the United Empire Loyalists in Ontario, and the sappers of the Royal Engineers, who did so much to open up British Columbia. No better beginning could be made to the new campaign of the Dominion government for attracting British settlers than a practical move to assist British soldiers who fought shoulder to shoulder with the men of the Canadian Expeditionary Force.
