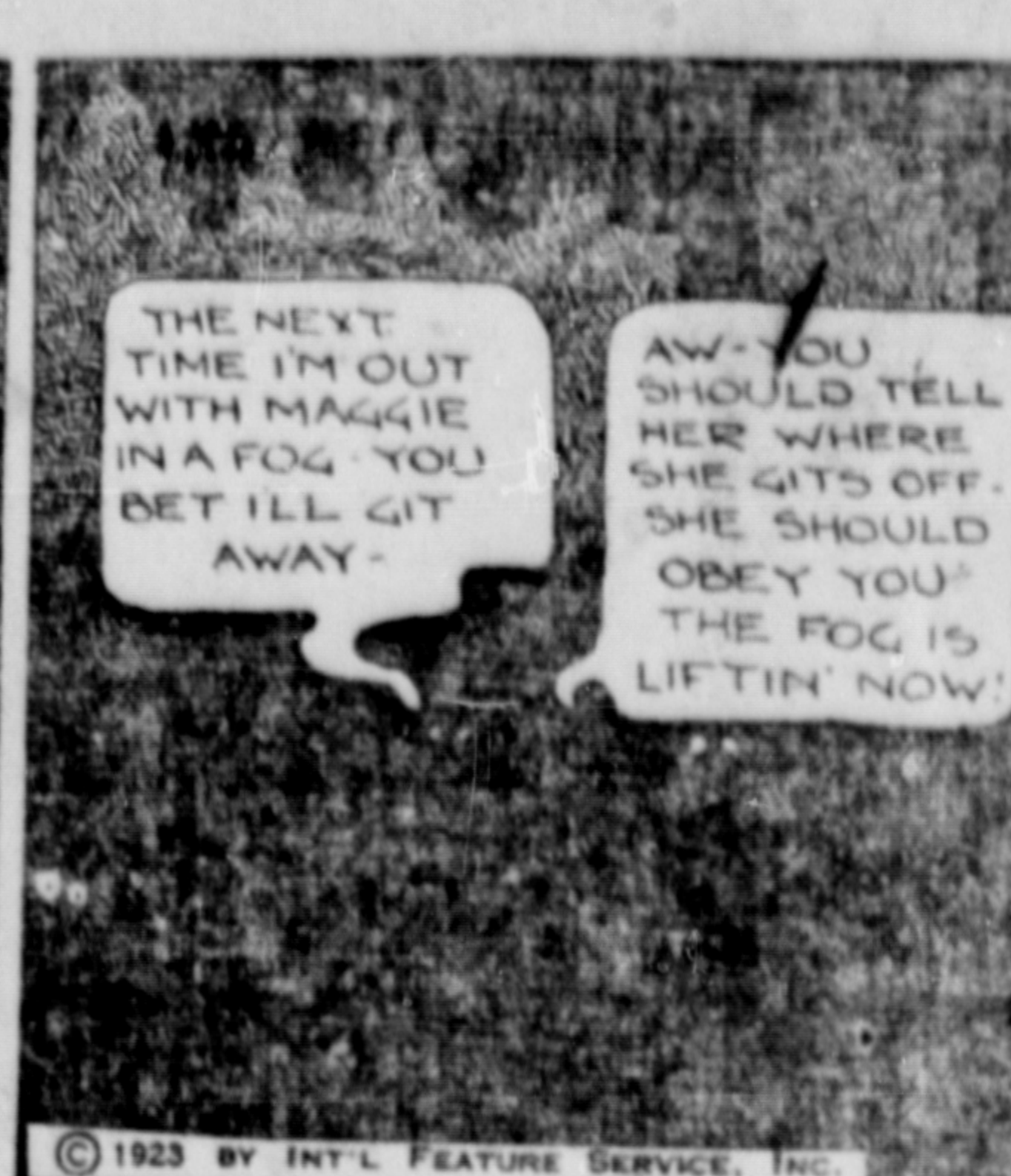
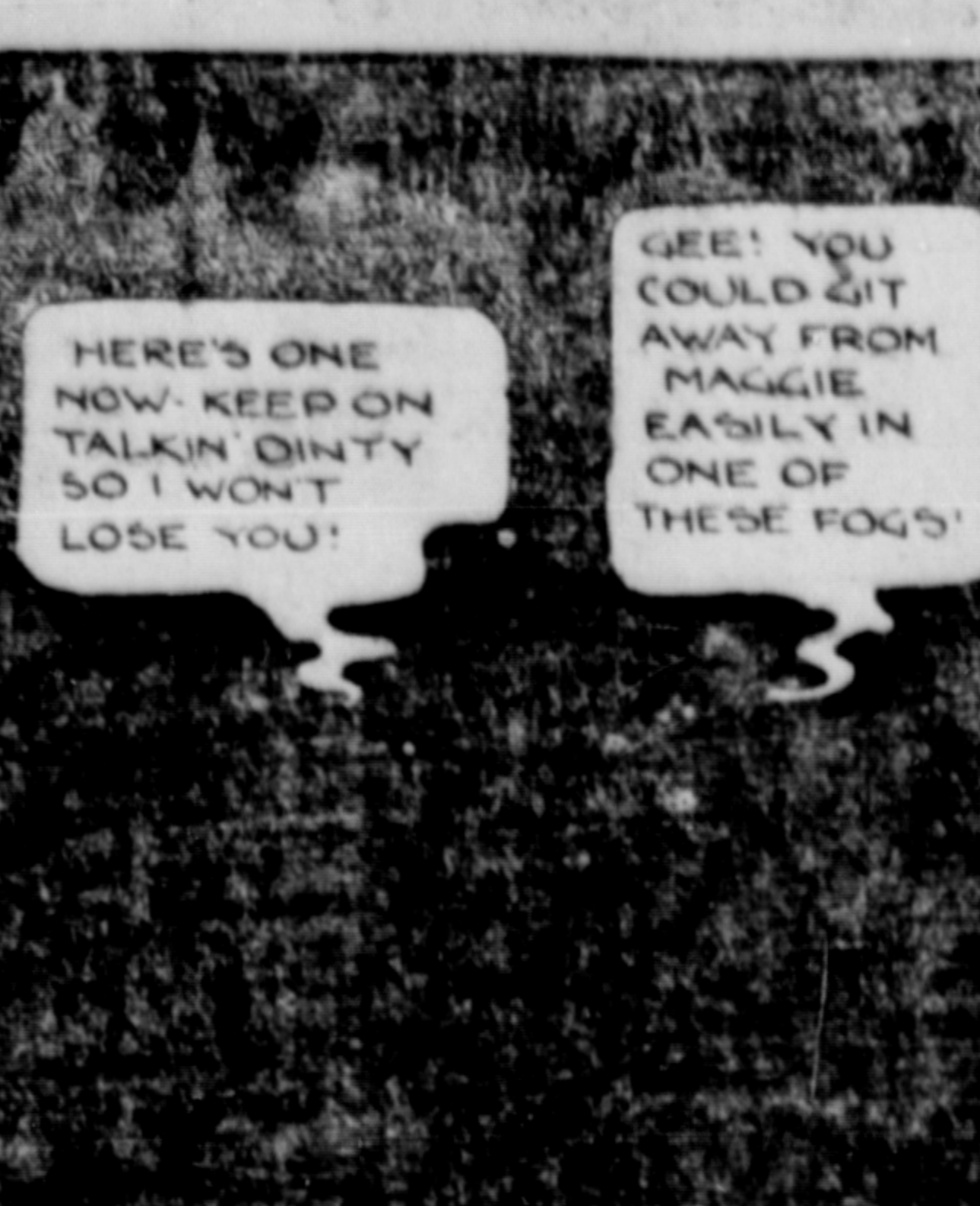

MEN'S BANQUET

Fine Spread Provided by Ladies  
and Interesting Program  
Followed

## BRIGHT ADDRESSES

Judge Young Gives Hints to  
Young Debaters Who Took  
Part on Occasion

A splendid spread with varied fare of music and speech was enjoyed by a large number of men of the Anglican Church in the Church hall last night. Addresses were given by Judge Young, Archbishop DuVernet, Consul Wakefield, Mayor Newton and H. E. Pullen and five minute speeches were made by four members of the debating club, George Hill, H. A. Philpott, J. W. Nicholls and A. W. Healy. S. K. Campbell sang two solos and also led the community singing which was one of the features of the evening. J. Austin played a selection on the piano and also accompanied the others. Archdeacon G. A. Rix closed with a few words of appreciation of what the others had done.

The ladies who provided the supper and waited on the tables included Mrs. Whitehead, convener, Mesdames Tremayne, Pillsbury, Wright, McNicholl, Oelhard, Groves, McMullin, Philpott, Duncan, Lee, Beaumont, Cade, Evitt, Barnsley, Kemp, Mills, LaTrace, Woodland, McLennan, Bone-Stephens, Greer, and Miss Smith.

In replying to a toast to the press Mayor Newton complimented Archdeacon Rix on the work he was doing in connection with the church. He spoke of the fine banquet and the good attendance and mentioned something of the difficulties of a clergyman which he said resembled the difficulties of the editor of a newspaper.

H. E. Pullen replying to the same toast spoke with appreciation of the work of Archbishop DuVernet, who like a good newspaperman, wrote only when he had a message for the people. He said that the Archbishop would be long remembered for carrying the civilizing influence of the church to the uttermost corners of the vast diocese over which he presided, a diocese comprising half the province of British Columbia. He would be remembered for his broadmindedness and divine tolerance but he prophesied that he would be remembered longest for the discovery he had made in proving the influence of mind or "radio mind" as he preferred to call it. This would have a far reaching influence in the world.

## The Debating Class

Each of the four members of the debating class had a subject, speaking respectively on the contribution of Ireland, Scotland and England to Canada and the result.

George Hill mentioned some of the great Irishmen who had been leaders of Canadian life and said that the Irish were foremost in everything. He mentioned the ready wit of the Emerald Islanders and suggested that the dour Scotchman, the stolid Englishman and the irrepressible Irishman was the basis for a splendid race.

H. A. Philpott spoke humorously of the haggis which was made up of fish, flesh and fowl and was supposed to be food; of the haggis which were supposed to produce music and of the kilts which were supposed to be clothes. There was also a liquid about which he was aware they

knew nothing. It was not difficult to say things about the Scotch, when remembering their principles and products. They were the finest colonists in the world and Canada had always proved attractive to them. He mentioned many great Scotsmen and said that people of that country always held the high positions in life.

J. W. Nicholls spoke of the self-assertiveness of the English. There was a part of the history of Canada of which they were not proud and that was when the country provided a sort of practice football game for the House of Commons in England. After Montcalm's brave army had been overcome by the brave British army, England had contributed politically, socially and financially to the upbuilding of the country. Canadian laws were founded on English laws, her constitution was founded on the English constitution dating back to Magna Charta. English home life had had an influence on Canadian home life. At least 85 per cent of the money used in developing the country came from England. Ecclesiastically the Anglican church was almost identical with the English church. In closing Mr. Nicholls quoted from the English poet Keats.

A. W. Healy said Canadians were on a pinnacle by themselves. They represented the perfect man. He would not detract
