### Employers of Longshoremen Declare for Open Shop and Negotiations are off at Present

VANCOUVER, Nov. 1 .- The strike of longshoremen, which has been in effect in British Columbia ports since October 9, settled down today to a contest of endurance between the strikers and their employers. The matter is at a deadlock with the shipping and stevedoring companies refusing to negotiate with any official of the international longshoremen's union and the strikers refusing to concede more than that their representatives in any negotiations shall represent the workers and not nominally represent the union.
