BEER PLEBISCITE IS LIKELY TO BE ASKED

Government Urged to Submit Referendum It is Stated in Victoria

VICTORIA, Sept. 15.—Strong representations in favor of a plebiscite on open beer sale in British Columbia are being made to the Provincial Government. The question has not been discussed by the Executive Council yet, but the whole question will be given consideration before the House meets, it is understood.

Pressure is being brought to bear by private members of the House for the holding of a beer plebiscite. Several members who have visited Victoria lately have urged this course upon the Government. Some of these members formerly voted against any move to allow for more open sale of beer in the Province. They have changed their minds, it was explained, because the liquor situation, in their opinion, has altered completely since the matter last came before the legislature. The spread of beer clubs all over the Province, they declare, has made it necessary to get a public expression on the whole beer issue.

Reports from Vancouver that the Government has decided to bring down legislation arranging for a beer plebiscite was denied officially at the parliament buildings. As stated, the Executive Council has not considered the matter. It is unlikely that any policy on the beer question will be announced until the House meets and the views of outside members has been ascertained. The beer question is expected to loom large in the legislature at its Fall session.

SKIRMISHER IS DUE TONIGHT FROM SOUTH

Will Load Over 500,000 Feet of Lumber and Several Hundred Cases of Salmon for Japan

C.G.M.M. steamer Canadian Skirmisher is due at 9 o'clock this evening from the south to load something over 500,000 feet of hemlock lumber and several hundred cases of canned salmon for Japan. On arrival in the harbor, the Skirmisher will proceed to the Imperial Oil dock to take on fuel and in the morning will drop down to the lumber/assembly wharf to start loading there. Capt. Hilton is in command of the Skirmisher and Capt. Duncan McKenzie, company pilot, is bringing her up the coast.

BODY OF NATIVE WOMAN IS FOUND

Provincial Police Office is Advised by Lowe Inlet Cannery—Identity Not Disclosed

Word was received at the provincial police office last night that the body of a native woman had been found floating on the water at Lowe Inlet cannery. The identity of the dead woman and particulars are not given. Chief Minty said this morning that the matter would probably be investigated by his force.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.
 Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
 Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which non-timber land.
 Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
 Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation, or, if because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
 Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$50 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years required.
 Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in connection with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
 Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained by fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
 For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 50 acres may be leased by one person or company.
 Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 50 acres may be purchased, conditions include payment of stumpage.
 Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.
 PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
 The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.
 No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 28, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.
 Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.
 Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces or conscripts, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.
 SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS
 Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1925.
 GRAZING
 Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
