

GAME BOARD HELD MEETING

Inspector Parsons Returns From Prince George and Tells of Gathering

T. W. S. Parsons, inspector of D. Division of the Provincial Police, returned to the city last night having attended a meeting of the Provincial Game Board, held at Prince George on September 13 and 14. Inspector Parsons states that the meeting of the board proved to be a very successful one from the point of view of the members of the board, and that in future Prince Rupert and points east would be included in the itinerary of future meetings. The Game Board met under the chairmanship of M. B. Jackson, K.C., M.L.A., and among those present were T. Booth, G. B. Williams and F. R. Butler, secretary to the board. E. Hyde, of Hazelton, and W. J. McCallan, Fort Fraser, represented the department of Indian affairs. A large number of trappers and fur traders were present at the meeting.

Subjects Discussed

Among the subjects discussed were the registration of trap lines, on which subject the opinion as to the desirability of such action was unanimous. The open and close seasons and the exclusion of all except British subjects to the right of trapping within the province were subjects discussed at length. The question of fur royalty came up. It was agreed that a different form of stamping from that now used on furs would be instituted.

Impressed With Success

The idea of the Game Board visiting the northern points has so impressed the members that on terminating the proceedings at Prince George the chairman announced that the northern tour would become one of their fixed customs and that the next itinerary of the board would include Prince Rupert and points east. The members of the board left Prince George on Saturday for Quexnel where another meeting is to be held. Upon completion of the northern tour the board will meet in Vancouver and will formulate a policy based upon the data submitted at the northern meetings.

"BIRTH OF A NATION" BANNED IN PARIS

"The Birth of a Nation," D. W. Griffith's famous film, which was presented at the Marivaux Cinema on the Grands Boulevards, has been banned by the French authorities.

This is the last manifestation of French solicitude for "men of color." The film, which was passed by the censor only ten days before, and had indeed previously been shown in Paris, reproduces, as is well known, certain episodes of the War of Secession, and also depicts excesses of the negroes after their liberation from slavery. It traces also the origin of the Ku Klux Klan movement. Its presentation has not provoked any public demonstration of protest, but the Prefecture of Police, in conformity, it is stated, with M. Poincaré's recent declaration of principle, has suppressed the presentation "for the good of the people."
