NEIL BONDS MINES ADMIRALTY ISLAND

Man Who Formerly Managed Premier Interests Himself in Alaskan Property

R. K. Neill, prominent mining man of Spokane, has taken an option on 69 gold quartz claims located on the west side of Hawk Inlet, on Admiralty Island, according to a statement made today by Charles Williams, one of the original locators and now owner of the property. Mr. Williams returned to Juneau on the steamer Princess Mary from Seattle where the deal was consummated.

FAIRBANKS CARRIED SPECIAL INSURANCE

While Douglas Fairbanks was playing Robin Hood, the big picture that is coming here next week, he carried nearly half a million dollars in life insurance, all of which was in addition to the usual amount of protection of this kind that has been written for him. The exact amount of the insurance carried during the filming of the Robin Hood picture was \$180,000, written in two policies by Lloyds. The first policy of \$300,000 was for death from any cause, accident, and all sickness, from April 1 to July 31. The second policy was for death from accidental death and covered the same period of time. The reason for this large amount of insurance, said to be one of the biggest sums ever carried by an individual, was due to the danger and risk attendant to filming of this extravagant picture. That portion of it was collected in advance to the bank of the magnetic and agile Douglas.
