TERRACE MAN WAS SUICIDE

Coroner's Jury Finds That Isaac Bedore Took His Own Life While Mentally Deranged

A verdict of death by suicide while in a state of mental derangement was brought in by the jury in the inquest at Terrace yesterday morning into the death of Isaac Bedore before Coroner Walter Gale. The jurors were Henry Halliwell (foreman), S. M. G. Kirkaldy, H. G. Sparkes, H. S. Creelman, W. Vanderlip, and Fred Dubourd. The witnesses included deceased's relatives, Constable Manoir and Dr. Bleecker.

Deceased shot himself through the heart with a 30-30 rifle and lived for 80 minutes after half of his heart had been blown away. He had been only out of the penitentiary for six weeks after having been committed there for two years on a charge of attempted rape from Rose Lake.

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon after the inquest, Rev. T. J. Marsh officiating. Frank Morris, manager of the B. C. Undertakers, had charge of arrangements and interment was made at Terrace.

TEACH ENGLISH TO CANADIANS

Nova Scotia Has Undertaken That Stupendous Task and Is Succeeding

HALIFAX, N.S., May 10.—(By Canadian Press.)—Nova Scotia, long regarded as a "well of English, pure and undefiled," is about to have its waters ruffled by a spirit in the person of Rosamond M. de Wolfe Archibald, a member of the staff of Acadia Seminary at Wolfville, in a drive for better English.

Miss Archibald has a brand new system of teaching the spoken word—her own invention by the way—and is credited with having revolutionized the speaking of English in the common schools of the town in which she lives. Invited by the Canadian Press to explain her method, Miss Archibald submitted the following statement:

"Were you ever challenged by a German student to better the common speech of your people? Did one of them ever call you a 'race of slovenly speakers'? Did the thought of the economic waste of education in general that fails to make the splendid gift of the 'cross roads' equal his scientific peers in the spoken word, ever keep you awake nights? That is exactly what happened to me."

"With years of preparation back of me and boundless enthusiasm, I began to teach English to Canadians, following up my own preaching of 'Canada First.' I used every method I knew with the usual results—body was speaking correctly outside my class room."

Light Dawned

"One day, during the war, light dawned. I realized the swift change from a raw recruit to a finished soldier that a month of military drill produced. Then I saw that amazing folly in our methods of teaching 'correct' speech. I reasoned: Did I learn that 3x3—9 by seeing that 3x3 is not 10? Did I learn first the reason why 7x9—63 or simply that 7x9—63? Why, then, continue teaching English speech by such methods? In a trice I had cast off all the inefficient methods of the past. I called my pupils to their feet, to stand at attention, to salute the flag, and to recite in concert a few correct sentences, drill fashion! How they responded! Then I sent them forth to correct errors, copying down correction only (get my point?), of all mistakes detected at home, in school, in public speaking. The effect on their speech was magical. In a week of practice we had accomplished what a lifetime of theory has often failed in accomplishing."

"Then we put on weekly 'drives' during the term, awarding small prizes for 'points' in correction. We insisted on courtesy, the lack of which on the part of any contestant caused his immediate disqualification. **Playing the Game**

"As a result, today, parents are playing the game of corrections with their children and, incidentally, benefiting by it. Public speakers throughout the Maritime Provinces, especially, are aware of note books for correction in their audiences. The child links up his language with his flag which for centuries has been dyed in the blood of our race for the preservation of our Mother Tongue. He is made to feel that it is just as treasonable to make a mistake in his speech as to dishonor that flag. He catches a vision of greatness in language never before realized. His motto is—

"To think clearly and to speak the King's English."

"Nova Scotia is about to launch a Better English Week Drive, May 25-June 1. Leading newspapers are giving it prominence. Teachers are flocking to the standard eager to adopt a method so simple, attractive, and philosophically sound. Educationists, including eminent psychologists are approving of it."

The fervid thanks recorded in letters flooding my mail box leads me to believe that I have found something to give my people whom I delight to serve. I believe we may safely look forward to a National Better English Week for Canada. By-the-way, my home town, Wolfville, Nova Scotia, intends to win in the competition!"
