Prince Rupert's Advantages as an Ocean Port Set Forth in Post Card Just Issued

A card showing the advantages of Prince Rupert as an occan port on one side and a picture of the new dock on the other has just been issued by the publicity committee of the Board of Trade and copies are being sent to all members of the Dominion parliament and of the Alberta Legislature. A limited number are being placed at stores where picture postcards are usually sold and Prince Rupert citizens are asked to co-operate with the Board of Trade by buying these cards and sending them to people whom they think may be interested. Following is the information given on the card;

PRINCE RUPERT AND TRANSPORTATION. Prince Rupert is the logical port for export of grain and lumber to all parts of the world.

Prince Rupert has one of the four best harbors in the world, open all the year round.

Prince Rupert, the safest and cheapest port on the Pacific, is 465 miles nearer the Orient than Vancouver and 189 miles neager Sydney, Australia, than that port. An engine can haul as heavy a train of freight from

Edmonton to Prince Rupert as across the prairie. Developing trade through Prince Rupert means providing an outlet for the products of the richest agricultural area in the west.

All import and export business through Prince Rupert benefits the Canadian National Railway only.

All the grain from the prairies should be exported through Prince Rupert over Canada's railway, shipped from her own docks without tolts, switching charges or dock charges parable to other interests,

The Canadian National has to pay tolls to the Great Northern and G.P.R. on every ton exported through Van-

Ultimatum of President Cosgrove to Irish Rebels

DUBLIN, Feb. 17 .- President Cosgrove has issued a last word statement on the peace question declaring the government is determined to "put down this revolt against democracy regardless of cost."

"Let no man be deceived," the statement continues, "if anyone continues the unnatural war upon his own people after the expiration of the period stated in the amnesty (tomorrow) he must be prepared to pay the penalty in full. There will be no going back on this."

"It must also be clearly understood," the statement recites, "that there will be no meeting for negotiations beween the government and Liam Lynch. De Valera, or any of their collaborators in destruction."
