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**DOMESTIC SCIENCE SALE AND EXHIBIT**

Affair Yesterday Afternoon Was Most Successful—Display of Work Caused Much Complimentary Comment

The bazaar and exhibit of work of the domestic science classes of the public and high schools which took place yesterday afternoon at the Booth Memorial School was a most successful affair in every respect. About 150 ladies patronized the affair and the proceeds amounting to \$133 were considered most satisfactory by all concerned.

The exhibit of work caused many most complimentary remarks and many of the ladies present were indeed surprised at the results obtained as reflected in the work on display. The public school exhibit consisted of plain sewing, handwork and the high school work consisted chiefly of garment and dress-making machine work. Many of the garments had been designed by the girls themselves.

### NEW ENGINE IN EDWARD LIPSETT

Is the First Canadian Halibut Boat of This Port to Have Semi-Diesel Engine Installed

The halibut schooner Edward Lipsett, Capt. John Peterson, reached port yesterday with 12,000 pounds of fish, after her first voyage to the banks following a recent change of importance in her motive power. The Lipsett now has the distinction of being the first Canadian halibut boat fishing out of Prince Rupert to have a semi-diesel engine. Early in April in the south she had a 35 horse-power Frisco Standard semi-diesel engine installed, replacing the former 20 horse power Frisco Standard gasoline engine.

She left Vancouver for the fishing banks on April 28, arriving here after being twelve days out. Her catch incidentally, pulled down the highest price paid at the Exchange yesterday, 13.7c and 8c.

The Edward Lipsett is named after the pioneer fishing boat supply man of Vancouver who sold the first halibut gear on the Pacific Coast. His customer was Greer Starrett then manager for the New England Fish Co. at Vancouver. Mr. Starrett, who is at present in Seattle, is now engaged in the sturgeon fishing business on Stuart River near Vanderhoof.

bills be collected when due instead of allowing them to run on.

Mr. McBae said they had already made arrangements for collections and had given the secretary instructions to allow no one in the private wards without payment in advance and also to collect where possible from those in the public wards.

Mr. Williams moved in amendment that in accepting the 60c, the board feared it would be impossible to finance on it but would do their best. They feared they would have to come back to the council for a bonus.

This was defeated.

Mr. McBae moved that they stand out for \$2.50 a day for city indigent patients. This was not seconded.

After a good deal of discussion Mr. Campbell's motion was put and carried and the board adjourned.
