



Trench Silo

A model of an inexpensive placed on the side of the silo. it is important that the ensilage be well compact to exclude the air and many farmers use a horse to trample it down. The silo is sealed with straw and ridged over the top to permit of drainage. This class of silo can be erected at little expense. trench 8 feet by 12 feet and 25 feet long will hold 50 tons of ensilage.
